### MOTTISFONT PARISH COUNCIL

30mph limit village centre: The Parish Council has been successful in its bid for a 30mph village centre speed limit in Hampshire County Council's "village30" scheme, and this should be implemented within the next three months.

Spearywell Road Speed Limit Gateway: This is now in place and will hopefully provide a visual reminder to people to slow down. Thanks to HCC who are providing most of the funds for this project, and also for the new nameplates recently erected.

B3084 40mph limit: Following recent accidents outside Lime Kiln Farm, the Parish Council is pushing for a number of preventative measures. Test Valley Borough Council has agreed to put up "Slippery Road Surface" signs at this accident blackspot, and Hampshire Highways will be resurfacing during the next financial year. It has also requested "Bend Ahead" warning signs together with advisory "Max 30" signs to be considered, and is awaiting a reply on this one. The Parish Council is also working on a proposal to extend the 30mph from near the River Dun, to continue up Hatt Hill and end near the village hall. In addition, it has also requested police speed checks, which will be undertaken by the Roads Policing Unit from Totton

Mottisfont Bridge Sight Lines: At a meeting with the National Trust it has been agreed to cut back the foliage. Other suggestions being looked at include the section of footway round the corner of the bridge, which could be pulled in a bit, and chevron signs. TVBC has indicated it might be possible to put in a central white line.

Mottisfont Bridge Repairs: Having had barriers in place for 12 months or more, the Parish Council is pushing for necessary work to be completed as soon as possible. The last report from Hampshire Highways stated that it intends to carry out major refurbishment of the bridge parapets, replacing the majority with new oak panels. Work on the carriageway will be undertaken at the same time, when the lane will be closed for the bridge work. A sub-contractor has now been agreed, so it should be done shortly! This month marks the first anniversary of our "Going Live" and it has been an extraordinary year for all of us. Little did any of us realise what we were letting ourselves in for when first inspired by Colin Wensley-Smith's talk on 18th January, 2006, and how much support would be received for such a scheme.

The fund-raising was hugely successful and Awbridge can be proud that the funding for our scheme was raised far more quickly than any other scheme in Hampshire. The predicted start-up time is usually 2 years, so to be up and running in 10 months deserves recognition and thanks to all who worked so hard at the Jumble Sale, Barn Dance, Duck Race at Mottisfont, Coffee Mornings, and also for all the villagers who supported all these events and kindly gave donations.

During these 12 months we have attended 39 calls and have provided cover for all but 3 nights from 10pm until 8am. We hope not to be called, as this means someone is in trouble, but it must be reassuring to know that help is close at hand should an emergency arise, and this is what drives us as volunteers.

# **CONSUMER CORNER**

John Millns writes (with some passion!) about his experiences with security lighting. Some models can be switched on, overriding the sensor, by briefly switching off the mains supply. Of course, brief interruptions to the supply are quite a common occurrence, especially in rural areas. He calculates that a 500W light running for a fortnight could cost over £16 in electricity!

John recommends avoiding lamps with this facility, often described as manual override, although he notes that some models require a double break in the mains supply, which should be more reliable.

Dear Friends,

We step into October and the season of the gathering in of the harvest. For most, the crops have long since been gathered in by massive machines and just a few workers, compared with the powerful imagery brought to us in the harvest hymns such as "We plough the fields and scatter", written in the mid-eighteenth century. Then, all the many farm labourers and horses would have been evident, all of



course long since gone. What a different place our rural benefice would have been then! With villages buzzing with the ordinary folk of the land, with shops and children, and village schools, and squires and candles and people most of whom would bring their produce to church and thank God for the harvest.

Now we see the harvest spread out before us in our incredible supermarkets where we can buy everything from food to computers, wheeling it into our cars and paying with plastic. The abundance of the food we can choose from, the quantity and the variety are all things to be thankful for.

Yet something of the goodness of the harvest is timeless: the need for thanksgiving, to be thankful to God for what we have, yet with concern and giving to the needy. It is so important for all of us to pause for a moment in our frantic lives, to think further than the next shopping trip and for the welfare and spiritual care of our souls, to pray and worship and be thankful. We need to feed our souls as well as our bodies; to stop and say thank you to God, to gather together, to praise God. This is our spiritual medicine.

Today we still can bring our harvest offerings to church, and it is all well used, as after our services we send all produce brought to church to the St James's Shelter in Southampton. This is a place where the homeless can find a bed for the night and a square meal, and is somewhere warm and safe to lay their heads.

The point is this: Jesus used the harvest to teach us about love and self giving, about our spiritual lives. The seed that falls on stony ground withers up, he said, "but the seed which falls on the good rich soil of faith and service brings forth abundant fruit".

You see, the greatest harvest of all is not the crops, but the people. These are the people whom Christ gave his life for, and whom he calls us to love and support wherever we can, which is never an easy task, but always a blessed one.

So please join with us throughout the Benefice as we gather to thank God for the harvest. Please see the list of services published below.
