# Are you a safe cyclist?

As the summer months bring out more cyclists onto the Mottisfont and Dunbridge roads all road users, cyclists, drivers and walkers, should be aware of visibility and safety.



Road safety specialists recommend that Cyclists should:

- Wear suitable reflective and fluorescent clothing to be seen by other road users.
- Always wear a cycle helmet which is in good repair to reduce head injuries.
- Allow ample time and use hand signals to make drivers aware of their intention to turn either left or right.

#### And that Drivers should:

- "Think Bike" and "Think Walker" at all times. These road users can be difficult to see especially when the colour of their clothing merges into the surrounding hedges and trees.
- Give cyclists and walkers plenty of room when overtaking them and never turn shortly after overtaking. Cyclists have a tendency to wobble, and are easily affected by side wind, when being overtaken.

Here's to a safe summer on the roads and particularly in Mottisfont and Dunbridge.

## **Policing in Mottisfont**

We were very pleased to welcome Inspector Bernadette Smith to our Annual Parish Meeting, who is in charge of policing in Romsey and District. Insp. Smith explained that reported crime in the parish was low (19 incidents last year) and that the rural beat officer post was vacant at the moment but should be filled shortly. PC John Viney was getting around the villages in the meantime with his mobile police surgery and regularly parks in the Social Club.

She explained the way in which the police graded call-outs. Category 1 were 999 calls where life might be at risk and the police aimed to attend in 10 minutes. They tried to respond to category 2 calls within 30 minutes using area reaction teams: these were under the command of Andover but a team worked around Romsey. She was trying to get a locally based team under her command. Category 3 calls were the responsibility of her beat. She had to focus her resources on the areas with the most crime, for example, North Baddesley.

In order to get a stronger police presence on the streets, Insp. Smith said that Police Community Support Officers were being recruited. PCSOs had no power of arrest but provided intelligence and victim support. She explained that paperwork seriously reduced the time that her police officers could be out and about on the beat.

The Inspector was asked about enforcement of speed limits. She said that we didn't have many police call-outs to accidents in the parish (although our own statistics suggest otherwise) but rural speeding was an issue in most parishes in the area. She warned though that the biggest culprits were local people. There was (coincidentally?) a speed check on Barley Hill the day after our meeting. I wonder who got caught?

Hampshire Police are asking for all householders and operators of commercial premises with audible alarms to provide them with their keyholder details so that they can be registered on a new database of keyholders. The details are set out in a leaflet which can be down-loaded from the Police web site <a href="www.hampshire.police.uk">www.hampshire.police.uk</a>. Alternatively, one can be posted to you on request. Please call 0845 045 45 and ask for the Security Systems Administration office to obtain further details.


