FURTHER ENHANCEMENTS TO RAIL SERVICES

An hourly train service will be introduced at Mottisfont & Dunbridge station during weekdays and Saturdays starting from mid-December. It follows an increase in passenger numbers, and pressure put on South West Trains by Three Rivers Community Rail Partnership.

The existing Sunday service will remain in place for the foreseeable future.

As soon as the new timetables are available I will try to ensure every home in the parish receives a copy.

Three Rivers Community Rail Partnership is planning to carry on with the rail-bus link to Mottisfont Abbey and the Sir Harold Hillier Gardens next year. This service connects with trains at Romsey and Mottisfont & Dunbridge stations. It's possible the rail-link bus may include Romsey Abbey on its list of stopping places during 2009.

Car parking spaces have now been re-marked at Mottisfont & Dunbridge station after the original white lines had to be removed because a disabled parking place was installed in front of the passenger entrance and exit point on the Romsey-bound platform.

Three Rivers is currently investigating the possibility of securing more parking in the old goods yard area on the southern side of the station. A survey carried out by the organisation showed there was a shortage of parking, and people said they would use trains more if extra parking was available. It's hoped talks will be held with lan Bullivant, who owns the old goods yard, to see what can be achieved.

Mottisfont Parish Plan: Results of the survey

The survey was conducted throughout July and August 2008 using a questionnaire enclosed with the *Acorn*. The questionnaire included 24 potential priorities, and asked each respondent to state if they were 'very important', 'important' or 'not important'. Respondents were asked additionally to name their 'top three' – if they could only vote for only three things from the list, what would they be. Finally, they were asked to provide additional ideas.

53 questionnaires were returned from 44 addresses, including two outside the parish but very close to our boundary. They have been included in the results. There are 140 properties in the parish and 270 electors, so the response rate, on the basis of households, was 30% (omitting the two questionnaires from outside the parish). This is a very good response rate for a questionnaire.

The parish's priorities were, in order:

- 1. Dealing with flooding at Bengers Lane and Lockerley Road (weighted score 112)
- 2. Continuing to support the Village Hall Committee in providing facilities and events for the parish (weighted score 98)
- 3. Working with the Police to maintain a dedicated police officer in our rural area (weighted score 96)
- 4. Create a footpath by the Station Goods Yard on Barley Hill (weighted score 89)
- 5. Retaining the allotments in Dunbridge (weighted score 87)
- 6. Work with the National Trust and housing associations to improve the tenanted housing in the parish (weighted score 85)
- 7. Reduce the 40mph speed limit on the B3084 to 30mph (weighted score 84)
- 8. Extend the footpath on Hatt Hill if possible (weighted score 80).

The only other potential priority that had a high score was to consider a play area for local children (weighted score 76). After that, there was a clear gap.

The analysis was undertaken by Parish Councillors Jacquie Horne and Jeff Channing.

Dear Friends,

November is the month to Remember. With Remembrance Sunday falling on 9th November, we are given a fresh opportunity for remembering our own lads and lasses who are being killed and injured in the Iraq and Afghanistan conflicts, and other places in the world. So often now, a flag-draped coffin arrives home without general notice, flown back to this country carrying the body of one of our young people killed in the service of our country. Each death and each serious injury brings long lasting suffering and distress to the families of loved ones killed in these places. We should and we must remember not only those of past conflicts, but also those

Jesus said, "Greater love has no one than this, to lay down his life for his friends" (Jn 15.13). Whatever your attitude to war, you can do something for peace this year. Each one of us, whether we intend to go to worship on that day or not, can take a few moments to stop and think, and pray for peace and justice in our world. We can remember our own troops risking and giving their lives, and we can remember especially the little children caught up these conflicts. Prayer does not seek to draw God towards us since, as St Augustine said, he is closer than we are to ourselves. Its purpose is to bring us close enough to him for conversation. Prayer makes us aware of his nearness. "Out of the deep have I called to thee, O Lord" (Psalm 130.1).

Finally, as we ponder on sacrifice and self-giving, the Church also calls us in November to remember All Saints on 1st November, and All Souls on 2nd November. Not to forget Armistice Day on 11th November.




- 2. <u>Eight in a row</u> Now do the same for four of each coin, and in four moves.
