Roi Wilson

It is with sadness that we have learnt of the death of former Mottisfont Parish Council chairman Roi Wilson. Roi, who moved from Mottisfont to Cheshire in 1997, was in his eighty-eighth year. He passed away at Iddenshall Hall in Tarporley on 18th March. His two daughters, Faith and Juliet, survive him. Roi was Parish Council chairman between 1993 and 1997. He was a retired Royal Naval Captain and was awarded a CBE for his services.

Present Parish Council chairman John Millns said Roi was "one of life's great characters", and there had been some amusing moments when Roi and his late wife Christine lived in the village. "One incident that is particularly memorable was the day Roi decided to cut down a large tree. I was out at the time and on returning he called me across to see something 'interesting'. Well it was certainly interesting and most unusual. I have never seen a tree growing out of a summerhouse before. The U-shaped groove in the roof and the bowed sides gave it a distinctive architectural style and was very decorative, but unfortunately not very waterproof," recalled John, who was Roi and Christine's neighbour at Mottisfont for 25 years.

During the 1960s, while in the Royal Navy, Roi often passed over Mottisfont in a helicopter, and he would wave to his daughter Juliet and other pupils as the chopper swooped low over the village school – much to the excitement of everyone including the headmistress Mrs. Nancy Cockrill.

MOTTISFONT PARISH COUNCIL

At the parish council meeting on the 31st March, a minute's silence was observed at the beginning of the meeting in respect of Roi Wilson, who sadly passed away on the 18th March. Roi was Chairman of Mottisfont Parish Council from 1993 to 1997. The block and gavel he made and donated to the Parish Council is still in use today.

VILLAGE HALL

The Village Hall has a new bunded oil tank to comply with regulations. This, plus the cost of decorating the inside and outside of the hall, have largely been covered by a lottery grant obtained by Cllr. Jacquie Horne.

VILLAGE CENTRE TRAFFIC CALMING

After lengthy discussions with HCC to agree a plan to improve the junction at Hatt Lane, the Parish Council has decided not to go ahead with the plan at the moment. Although some grant aid was offered, the Parish Council was required to fund the scheme by a further £1000, and the plan HCC offered did little towards calming the traffic.

At the April meeting we welcomed Lynne Jenkins, who has recently come to live in the village.

Local 'Green Man' Brian Raines spoke with a passion about the Nature Reserve he has established at Awbridge. The Reserve, which is a haven for wildlife, is home for Arthur the goat, rare breeds of sheep, deer, grass snakes, geese and ducks. Woodcock and Redstarts are some of the birds frequently spotted. Brian is responsible for the brushwood figures which adorn the hedges in the area.

Houghton was the host for the Spring Group meeting in April. Mouth and Foot artist Tom Yendell, a victim of the drug Thalidomide and sadly born without arms, gave an inspirational and often amusing talk with slides. Tom, an accomplished artist who drives, skis, travels and rides horses, was born with some things possibly more useful than arms: a cheerful disposition, a positive attitude, a warm family life and a sense of trust in the Lord. He says that his life has been no different from any

of his able-bodied counterparts, except that he has had to use his mouth, foot or chin to carry out every-day tasks.

Are you up to the challenge?

Exciting new developments at your local National Trust-owned Mottisfont Abbey have created opportunities for more volunteers in a range of interesting roles. Mottisfont is known internationally for its rose garden, but how many people know the handsome old Abbey houses an outstanding collection of early 20th century art, with the world-famous River Test flowing through the tranquil, green grounds?

Volunteers already steward the house as well as the gorgeous gardens. Further projects at Mottisfont have created exciting new roles for volunteers. Examples of this are the Garden Information Room, which a group of volunteers are developing under the experienced eye of the Head Gardener. Another initiative is the volunteer coordinated Guided Tours Project. Volunteers are developing a number of different tours of the house, estate and gardens, that will appeal to different sorts of visitors. It is hoped that these will be trialled with the visitors in August.

To delight the visitors further, Mottisfont is forming a new team of volunteers who will help the Visitor Reception team welcome visitors at weekends. Mottisfont is looking for a select band of around 12 volunteers who are friendly and engaging, and would like to work on a rota basis with the fantastic

Visitor Reception team at weekends. All this additional activity has led to the development of a groundbreaking new initiative at Mottisfont, the formation of a Central Volunteering Team that will work with the Property Manager and her team to manage and coordinate the full range of volunteer activity at Mottisfont. The National Trust is a conservation charity, and is committed to conserving special places for ever, for everyone. These four volunteer roles are each an excellent opportunity to make a real contribution to their work and learn how a historic property operates behind the scenes. It is also a chance for the lucky people selected to use their skills in a friendly and supportive environment.

The staff at Mottisfont would love to hear from you if you are interested in any one of the four roles available. One role will concentrate on coordination and administration and would suit someone with a flair for organisation; this will be supported by a role that leads the recruitment of new volunteers, perhaps someone with an HR background? The third role will focus on outreach activities and provide a link to volunteer centres. The last role will support the training needs of volunteers, so may appeal to someone with a training background. More than anything, each role requires a flexible and friendly approach. Dear Friends,

What a wonderful Holy Week and Easter we all celebrated in the Benefice. We had some really special times of worship, and the worship on Easter Day was uplifting and Holy Spirit filled. Thank you to all who helped within the services and those who came to worship - and mostly to God for being present with us for these celebrations.



As we move into May we are considering the gift of the Holy Spirit to God's people. Pentecost falls on 31st May this year, and we will hear again the wonderful account of the giving of the Holy Spirit in the Book of Acts.

"When the day of Pentecost was being celebrated, all of them were together in one place. Suddenly, a sound like the roar of a mighty windstorm came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw tongues like flames of fire that separated, and one rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages as the Spirit gave them that ability." Acts Chapter 2:1-4

The Holy Spirit is a truly dynamic force without which the Church would not exist, for at Pentecost or Whitsun we are reminded that the giving of the Holy Spirit is an immediate consequence of the Resurrection. Following Jesus' Ascension, the Spirit virtually exploded onto the scene. The story is recorded in the Acts of the Apostles as above. It has been said that a more appropriate title for this book of the New Testament would be the Acts of the Holy Spirit. No other book speaks so much about the work of the Holy Spirit. Each baptised and confirmed Christian has a personal relationship with the Holy Spirit. The Father sent His Son, Jesus Christ, into the world so that through the Son He could gather the whole world back to Himself. The Father also sent the Holy Spirit into our hearts. Since (as St. Gregory of Nyssa taught) "there is no distance between the Son and the Spirit", the presence of the Spirit in our hearts brings us directly into communion with Christ.

This much is certain from a close reading of 'the Acts'. The actions of the Apostles and the work of the Holy Spirit are intimately connected. Whether in baptism, in the laying on of hands, in healing, in preaching, in praying, in fasting, in speaking in tongues, in appointing leaders and pastors of the Church, or in making decisions for the future teaching and ordering of the Church – whatever the apostles do, they do it in the Spirit. If one wishes to see evidence of the work of the Spirit in the early Church, one must look to the work of the apostles.

Our prayers are that we may all be filled with God's Holy Spirit, and that our lives will be fruitful in Christ's service and especially in love, peace and joy.

Driver wanted

The Broughton and Mottisfont Village Bus Committee runs as a charity to provide a service to the community. It takes about 30 volunteers to keep it going. With this number, the task for any one person is not too onerous. For example, a volunteer driver will be asked to make one trip a month. If someone is away or unwell, that obviously can be accommodated. So in a year the likelihood is that an individual might make, say, ten journeys. We have been operating with this arrangement since 1982.

At the moment we are experiencing a slight shortage of volunteer drivers and would like anyone interested in making this particular contribution to the excellent spirit of community in Broughton and




Mottisfont to come forward. Please note that this opportunity is open to people from Mottisfont and Dunbridge as well as Broughton. We are strictly volunteers and no payments are made to drivers, but it is perfectly legitimate to pay a mileage expense for anyone coming from Mottisfont in their own car to collect the bus and start a trip from Broughton.

The bus is easy to drive, with power steering, synchromesh gears and large mirrors. It is larger than a normal car, but we find that people readily adapt to the extra length. Drivers should be under the age of 70, preferably with a clean licence (normal car licence), although we may be able to accept someone with three points. No special training is required, but each volunteer undertakes a check drive with our Technical Manager. Once accepted, a route familiarisation trip is made, and then the new driver is ready to roll.

Georgina was promoting the charity Help for Heroes, which provides support for wounded servicemen returning from Afghanistan and Iraq, and has so far raised over £17m.


