PARISH COUNCIL

At the parish council meeting in July, the Parish Council discussed the most effective way of reducing the speed of traffic on the B3084. A number of parishioners have written to councillors proposing a 30mph speed limit in place of the current 40mph.

Councillor Simmonds reported that he had spoken to the Hampshire Highways Department and had been advised that the speed limit on the road was scheduled village hall in their memory. for a comprehensive review, but that it was not a priority at the moment. The Council resolved to request that an earlier review take place.

ROAD CLOSURES

The level crossing on the B3084 Romsey Road in Dunbridge, will be closed from Friday, 25th September "for a period of 3 months or until completion of the works whichever is sooner". It is expected that the closure actually required will be as follows:-2200 on 25th September to 0400 on 28th September, 0020 to 0500 on 29th September, 0030 to 0500 on 30th September, and 0020 to 0805 on 11th October.

Kimbridge Lane will also be closed "for works in connection with completion of the bridge and repairs to the carriageway" from Monday, 5th October. The closure notice also states "it is expected that the closure will be required for no longer than two weeks. Reasonable facilities will be provided to allow access to adjacent premises while the work is being carried out."

THE NATIONAL TRUST

Repair work to barn at Mottisfont Abbey farmyard We started work in early September on one of our barns in Abbey farmyard. The barn nearest the recycling bins has a roof whose supporting timbers are feeling the strain of several hundred years of holding up a great weight of tiles. If you look at the roof, particularly on the south (Social Club) side of the barn, you'll see it is sagging badly in some places to the extent that tiles are slipping, there are holes developing and the whole structure is becoming unsafe.

So reluctantly and as a temporary measure, we will be taking all the tiles off in September, carefully packing them in crates for storage until the time comes to

rebuild the structure. This will take several weeks and once finished, the exposed roof timbers will be protected from the weather by a permeable membrane sheet.

I regret that we have had to take this action and for any inconvenience caused by the building work, but we need to ensure public safety. We hope to have a decision about the future of this barn in the next year, then we can restore the entire building - its roof and internal space, to give it a useful new lease of life for the next few hundred years.

No coach loads of American tourists, only Greek families and couples. We took a boat trip and saw dolphins and a pair of Eleonora's Falcons.

The island is unspoilt. There are no high rise buildings, although the drivers are crazy, the hills are pine covered, gardens are filled with lemon trees, fragrant jasmine, trumpet vine and other exotic flowers. Little shops sell hand made jewellery, dresses, shoes and bags. A wonderful place.

The moral of this story - never believe what you read in newsprint (apart from The Acorn).

The school has been very busy over the summer break, with improvements being made to the learning environment as part of a two-phase project. Children in our Class 1 (the youngest children) have come back to a refurbished classroom and designated cloakroom at the rear of the school, and a newly created large outdoor learning environment, which comprises tarmac and grass areas with access onto the field.

The changes have been very well received by the children and their parents, and have added greatly to the experiences we are able to offer. The next phase of works later this year will see the creation of a new entrance to the school, combined with a newly furnished library containing multimedia resources. Together these will enhance the school's existing good facilities even further.

We are very excited about these changes, which follow the improvements made to our computer provision earlier in the year, with wireless laptops being accessible to the children.

This term we look forward to taking our Year 6 children to France for a residential trip, as well as European Languages Day, and of course, later in the term, our Christmas events.

AN INVITATION - We at Mottisfont Social Club would like to start a 'village life' campaign by providing an environment for villagers to meet and get to know each other. Most of the existing members either used to, or have family that used to live in Mottisfont. We would like to invite the people of Mottisfont and Dunbridge to come and meet each other.

When I was a young girl growing up I would come to Mottisfont to stay with my grandparents over the weekends and holidays. My Grandfather was born in the village and when he married my grandmother they set up their home here. Everyone was friendly with everyone else and I made friends with local children and other villagers grandchildren. My Grandmother could name the people who lived in each house in Mottisfont and a good few in Dunbridge, it wasn't a nosey 'in your face' community, but one whereby people would look out for each other and spend 10 minutes to pass the time of day.

As the years have passed and people have for one reason or another

moved on, I find it comforting to know that the friendships I made all those years ago are still strong today. Families who have moved out of the village still come into Mottisfont Social Club to catch up and reminisce. Children of the families who lived in the village bring their kids to the Social Club and so in some aspects 'old village life' lives on.

I have moved into the house that my grandparents used to live in (and my great grandparents before them). I know a few of the older villagers through family friendships and connections, but sadly I can't claim to know all of my neighbours. Community life to some extent seems to have faded over the years. People move into the village but don't communicate with each other: some couldn't name their next door neighbour. This isn't a tragedy that just affects Mottisfont, it's happening to villages all over the UK. My first child is due at the end of October and nothing would make me happier than for him or her to grow up in the surroundings of Mottisfont, and have a village of life long friends to reminisce with when they are older.

When I attended the Village fete this year I was staggered at the amount of people who were there supporting it. It was wonderful to see and provided some hope of recapturing a community. I am not saying that you need to join the social club in order to
