### MOTTISFONT ABBEY DEVELOPMENT PLANS

In last month's edition of the Acorn, we gave details of a scheme for residents to deliver questions about the development plans at Mottisfont Abbey to Andy Simmonds, so that he could put them to Alison Evans, General Manager at the Abbey. Rather disappointingly, by the stated deadline Andy had received none. Despite this, he went ahead with the planned interview with Alison, and has sent us the following report. (Some questions were received three days after the deadline, but also after the interview had taken place.) - Eds.

MOTTISFONT Abbey's planned new visitor facilities will not result in the village centre becoming a traffic bottleneck. That is the view of the National Trust's general manager of the Mottisfont Estate, Alison Evans, who said: "We don't envisage any difference to the amount of traffic coming into the village either to deliver goods to us, or in the form of staff/volunteer cars. However, as a result of the Community Consultation Day in early October we realised there was considerable anxiety about the situation whereby visitors might park in the centre of the village instead of the visitor car park. I can see there are genuine concerns after hearing about the problems when the old Post Office and Tea Rooms were open."

Alison continued: "We are looking very hard at ways of ensuring this would not happen again as it is not in anyone's interest to revive problems that have happened in the past."

Alison said that proposed visitor facilities would be for the benefit of everybody, not just tourists coming to the Abbey. "The shop will be open to everyone and, provided there was sufficient demand from local residents, could sell newspapers, milk, stamps, etc. Tenants' eggs and other produce from people living nearby could also be sold in the shop. When the time comes, we would like to hear from people in the village who have produce to sell, to discuss how this might work.

"Generally, people in the village and surrounding area will benefit from employment opportunities at the Abbey, as they have done in the past. We want Mottisfont Abbey to be successful financially to be able to continue with the conservation work we are doing here," said Alison, adding that she was surprised that no one had written in with any questions following the article in last month's Acorn. "There had been some very strong views expressed about the proposals so I am very surprised that there was no response."

Pointing out that the National Trust was looking at all possible solutions available to limit any possible impact the plans could have on the heart of the historic village, Alison added "We are looking at a number of solutions with our specialist advisers, the parish council and local residents. For instance, the Parish Council has proposed a traffic-calming scheme in the village, which we have offered to contribute to the cost. I am aware that June visitor numbers have been a long-standing problem with the traffic difficulties this produces. So we are looking at a long-term solution to resolve this. In addition, we are encouraging green modes of

transport, such as catching the train to Mottisfont & Dunbridge Station and cycling.

"If we can find a solution, Dairy Cottage field or any overflow car park won't be used after summer 2011. That's my aim and I will do all I can to achieve it."

The planned visitor facilities at Abbey Farmyard, which includes a shop, café, toilets and a public telephone, will be linked to the current car park at the Abbey's Lower Lodge by a new path which pedestrians using Mottisfont Lane will be able to use.

Alison concluded that the Trust is looking to see whether it is possible to site the proposed visitor facilities elsewhere within the Abbey grounds, as it is important to fully explore all possible solutions, for the benefit of everyone who cares about the future of this beautiful and historic part of Hampshire.


