

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# Parish Council

The Parish Council has helped pay for new lighting and gates at the Village Hall. This will benefit users of the hall and will also improve security following the oil theft last year. In addition, it has been decided to install a low power spotlight on the pole near the gate, and in the porch to provide automatic illumination as people leave the hall.

Alison Evans of the National Trust gave a report at the March meeting, and confirmed that funding to convert the Abbey Farmyard to a new visitor centre had been agreed by the Trust. Architects would be appointed soon. It is hoped that the new facilities will be in place by March 2012, subject to planning permission. She will keep us updated on the plans.

At the Annual Parish Meeting, our Hampshire County Councillor, Andrew Gibson, and TVBC Councillor, Neville Whiteley, both contributed. Andrew spoke about the state of Hampshire's roads, about gritting, and the parish lengthsman scheme. Both he and Neville were concerned about value for money in the two councils.

Councillor Neville Whiteley reported that whilst there was still some conflict between Testway and Southern Water concerning the ownership of the disused cesspit at Dunbridge, Testway had agreed to make the site secure and safe by ensuring that access was not possible, and by filling in the cesspit with cement.

## **MOTTISFONT & DUNBRIDGE W.I.**

The speaker at our May meeting was Mr. John Smith who gave a very interesting talk about the Special Operations Executive (SOE) at Beaulieu, during World War Two.

He told how Winston Churchill had decided that in addition to the Army, Navy and Air Force, there needed to be a fourth force to train secret agents from many European countries who would then work behind the enemy lines with local resistance groups.

They trained at various establishments throughout the country, and finally entered the "Finishing School" at Beaulieu. Three thousand agents passed through Beaulieu during the war. Many of these were women, including a New Zealander Nancy Wake, now in her nineties, who was the most decorated woman in the war. It was a very thought-provoking meeting.

At our next meeting on Tuesday, 7th June, we welcome John Hanks, who will be talking about bees and bee keeping. This should be a very popular meeting, especially in view of the loss of bees and bee hives in recent years, and the vital role honey bees play in the pollination of food crops and in our environment.

At Hatt Farm we have established grass margins around all of our arable fields specifically to provide safe nesting areas and good feeding habitat for a variety of farmland wildlife.

For example, the rough, tussocky grasses provide the perfect habitat for field voles which are the main food source of the barn owl. Consequently the establishment of these margins has helped achieve a steady increase in barn owl numbers.

It is important that these margins remain quiet, undisturbed wildlife habitats. Therefore please keep to the marked footpaths on the farm and do not walk or allow your dog to exercise on these areas.

Dear Friends,

After this year's General Election it's so interesting to see the differing parties sitting in very unfamiliar places, some from opposition now working together with previous opponents, and those from Government now to opposition. It must be a strange perspective to be a Member of Parliament and to be sitting next to those who were once the opposition!



We all get used to ways of working and with certain perspectives, but life has a way of turning things upside down when we least expect it. The familiar suddenly is snatched away from us and new challenges face us. This is why we are asked to begin our days with prayer, so that we can have the strength and guidance of God in our daily lives. Interestingly, the sittings in both Houses of Parliament still begin with prayers. These follow the Christian faith, and there is currently no multi-faith element. Attendance is voluntary. The practice of prayers is believed to have started in about 1558, and was common practice by 1567. The present form of prayers probably dates from the reign of Charles II. Members of the public are not allowed into the public galleries during prayers.

So we can see that prayer through the ages in the morning has always been thought of as most important. We thank God that this important practice has not been done away with yet in parliament. Prayer is a deep well of resources for us all, and just as Broughton, Bossington, Houghton, and Mottisfont are full of bubbling streams, deep wells, and fonts (and indeed Broughton exports water all over the world), so prayer helps us to tap deeply down into God's limitless resources and bring forth buckets full of God's water of life. All we have to do is to take some time and actually go to the well of life. Jesus said, "Whoever drinks the water I give will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." (Jn 4:14)

In other words our thirst is quenched when we go to him in prayer and we receive the water of eternal life that contains all the wonderful Godly nutrients that we need to keep our souls and bodies healthy.


Here is one of the main daily prayers at Parliament:



# **RIP-OFF ROOFERS!**

Neighbourhood Watch received this report in early May from a resident in Wellow:

"We had a roofing company cold calling in our road. I found out the next day that my neighbour had agreed to have work done by them, due to start next week. When she told me what the estimate was I nearly fell over (got them down from £7,000 to £4,000 she said!).

"Enquiries with my brother who happens to be a roofer showed that £400 would be a fair price! Needless to say, warning bells started ringing. We have got our neighbour to cancel the contract.

"In the meantime, I emailed the company on Saturday to cancel it for her, but surprise, surprise, the email pinged back 'address unknown'. I have also contacted Trading Standards and am awaiting contact from their Fair Trading Team.

"I have spoken to Jo Cole at Romsey Police and given her the info, as I wanted someone to be around next week when the contractors were due to start in case they came round and tried to bully our neighbour."

If you have heard of anything similar, please report it to your Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator.

## The Thomas Dowse Trust

The Thomas Dowse Trust was created to provide people up to the age of 25 years with financial assistance towards educational requirements. The Trust meets four times a year (March, June, September and November) to award grants to those who show a need for financial assistance towards their education, whether it be for Pre-School, School, College or University.

The next Trust meeting will be held in September. All applications for the September meeting must be submitted to the Secretary, Mrs Christine Hoskins, The Old Thatch, High Street, Broughton, no later than the end of August. Any application received after this date will be carried forward to the next meeting in November 2010.

If you live in the Benefice of Bossington and Mottisfont and would like to apply for a grant, application forms can be obtained from the church, the village hall or the Secretary.

# **TEST VALLEY FARMWATCH**

For the past nine months I have been receiving reports that embrace Neighbourhood Watch, Farm Watch and Country Watch, and sometimes also Horse Watch.

I attended a Neighbourhood Watch local meeting early last year and advised the police that it was equally relevant for outlying villages to be included in the additional Watches, as it seemed more appropriate.

What has happened in the meantime is that in the Northern Test Valley Policing area (which centres on Andover) farmers and others including estate owners, commercial property owners, remote residences etc. have formed Test Valley Farmwatch.

This group has been highly successful over the past year and has encouraged the Police to try to expand this into the Southern Test Valley policing area. The northern operation is up and running, and all that is needed in the southern area is for interested parties to sign up. There is no cost for this for one year, and the likely cost for future years is approximately £25, based on this year's subscriptions paid by the northern group.

An invitation to a meeting at Awbridge Village Hall on 16 May attracted several local farmers and landowners who were enthusiastic about the scheme, which has many other benefits. There have been notable successes over the last year leading to prosecutions and recovery of stolen property. Background information shows that this arrangement has made the area a no-go zone for the criminals.

Generally communication is by email, mainly for speed and detail, but telephone calls and texts to mobiles are also employed for alerts to incidents and warnings.

Those that sign up will receive full details spelling out the additional benefits, and regular newsletters direct from the Romsey Rural Safer Neighbourhood Police Team.
