River Open Weekend: An Exclusive Invitation to Local Residents

The National Trust and Mottisfont Fly-Fishing Club are pleased to invite residents of Mottisfont and Dunbridge to come and experience the beautiful riverbanks of the Oakley, Rectory and Dun beats during the weekend of 20th/21st August.

This is during the August weed-cut period when the rivers are not fished, and so can be opened to local residents.

You are welcome to picnic, walk and enjoy the riverbanks between 9am and 9pm on Saturday, 20th and Sunday, 21st August.

The river margins are protected areas of Special Scientific Interest, so we request everyone to observe certain necessary restrictions. Please do not:

- Paddle, swim, or use boats or inflatables
- Leave litter
- Light fires
- Fish
- Drive on to the beats

Dogs are permitted, but must be kept on leads.

National Trust countryside staff will be giving a talk about what makes the chalk streams of Hampshire uniquely valuable and vulnerable ecosystems, and about the history of fishing at Mottisfont.

Please come to the Oakley Hut at 12pm on Saturday, 20th August (or the barn at Oakley Farmhouse if wet). All are welcome.

There will be an opportunity for up to 6 local residents interested in learning fly-fishing to have an afternoon's expert tuition from NT staff on August 20th: please email tuition@mottisfont.org.uk to reserve a place.

Are you safe, warm and secure at home?

The *Safe, Warm and Secure* pilot project has been established by the Wellbeing and Partnerships Team in Hampshire County Council, Age Concern Hampshire and the Shaw Trust to help people over 70 to keep safe, warm and secure.

The project is aimed at providing homeowners who are over 70 years old with support to help them improve and maintain their house. By keeping it safe, warm and secure they can continue to live independently at home with a positive quality of life.

The Safe, Warm and Secure Advisors provide free practical and emotional support for the older person, until completion of the work.

They are able to take referrals from professionals, voluntary organisations and directly from the public.

The project is an advice and guidance service, but cannot provide funding. It is available until December 2011.

The advisors can help people by:

- Identifying available grants and benefits
- Home repairs
- Loft and cavity wall insulation including loft clearance
- ♦ Home security
- ♦ Adaptations such as rails, stairlifts and ramps
- ♦ Community alarms and Telecare
- Arranging free home safety visits

Home Fire Safety

It may surprise you to hear that every year, the fire service nationally is called out to over 60,000 fires in the home. And every year, around 500 people die in these fires and over 10,000 are injured. If a fire occurs in your home, your chances of survival will depend on how quickly and safely you are able to get out. It has been shown that working smoke alarms can dramatically improve your safety at home.

British Standard (BS 5446 Part 1) approved smoke detectors can be bought from most good DIY stores and cost in the region of £4 each.

The most important thing you need is a working smoke alarm; without this you may not even wake up if you have a fire.

We all know how sensitive they are - think of how little smoke it takes to set one off when cooking. Smoke alarms are designed to be this sensitive so that they will sound as soon as a fire or smouldering starts, giving you as much time as possible to leave the building. Remember, you have just a few minutes before a fire can take hold.

If you live in open plan accommodation you may experience problems with false alarms. This is usually caused by cooking fumes. To alleviate this problem consider buying a detector that has a hush facility. With this detector you will be able to silence the alarm for a short period when cooking is taking place.

Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service (HFRS) will engage with the most vulnerable individuals and groups in our communities to offer a **FREE** home safety visit. This includes installing up to two **FREE** smoke detectors per property, offering fire safety advice specific to the house and the occupants lifestyle, and carrying out an informal risk assessment of the home to point out any fire hazards and offering solutions to reduce the identified risks.

Are you or a member of your family:

- Over 65 years of age
- Have a physical disability or are immobile without assistance
- Have learning difficulties or mental health problems that can lead to confusion
- ♦ Have any sensory impairment
- Recently returned from hospital
- Living in a thatched property?

Dear Friends,

Many in our Benefice will know that it was quite a shock to realise that in mid-June thieves had targeted St. Mary's and stolen the lead from the roof. It would happen just on the weekend of torrential rain and wind!



St. Mary's is an ancient building that many of us, whether we are regular worshippers or not, consider as ours, as the holy place of the village, a place that has been at the centre of village life for centuries - and suddenly we only have part of a roof!

What should our response be to such a happening?

First thoughts are "let me get my hands on the thieves", but upon consideration it is a great sadness that this happens so often to our churches in the land. It is sadness for us who feel aggrieved at the loss and damage to something beautiful and special, although to those who stole the lead it was probably just another public building. But it is also a great sadness to those who do feel the need to steal from others, whether that is churches or homes. Why do I say it is sad for the thief? Because as human beings we are deeply complex. The thief becomes a slave to the habit, and so it is much more long lasting and damaging.

At the time of Jesus, under the law a thief was required to pay back double the amount stolen (or more for certain livestock). If the thief could not pay, then the thief became a bondservant just like any other debtor. In other words, to forgive a thief is to forgive a debtor. The only difference is that an ordinary debtor who borrows £1000 owes £1000 under the law, while a thief who steals £1000 owes £2000. So, we are to forgive but to expect proper punishment and compensation.

The most important thing for the Christian is not to carry grievances as this damages us. To forgive is to heal ourselves, and at the same time it offers a door for those who have sinned against us to repent and find new life.

AWBRIDGE COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS



Ambulance Community Responder We are unpaid volunteers trained and directed by the South Central Ambulance Service to attend serious medical emergency calls and provide basic life support care until the arrival of the ambulance. We carry oxygen and a defibrillator as well as other medical equipment and can be with a patient very quickly – providing emergency life support care in the critical time before the ambulance arrives. This is particularly important in rural areas such as ours which can experience extended ambulance response times. We do make a difference!



How the scheme works.

A life threatening medical emergency occurs and a 999 call is made for an ambulance

Ambulance control then assess the call and despatch an emergency ambulance.

At the same time the on-call Community Responder is alerted by mobile phone and pager and makes their way to the scene.

The Community First Responder aims to arrive within minutes and is equipped and able to assist until the arrival of the ambulance.

You are not sent to road accidents, assaults or calls where you may be placed at personal risk.

What do I need?

To become a Community First Responder you simply need:-

- To be over 18.
- To have a caring attitude and a willingness to help others.
- Common sense.
- A bit of spare time.
- The use of a car.
- ◆ To be of good character.
- We are all CRB checked, as we enter vulnerable people's homes.

Interested?

We urgently need volunteers to join us as local Community First Responders.

You do **not** need to be an expert.

You are not expected to act as a paramedic or doctor.

You will be trained by the ambulance service in just one weekend and you will be supported by colleagues in our group as required.

There are 6 monthly training updates to maintain our expertise.

You can give as much or as little time as you wish.

You can fit it in around your home or work commitments.

RECIPE FOR JULY: BAKED STUFFED COURGETTES

Courgettes are the sort of vegetable, in my opinion, that need a little va va voom added to them to make them interesting. This recipe makes eight delicious courgettes, and serves 1 or 2 per people.

Ingredients:

- 75g of long grain rice
- 8 large courgettes, approx. 275g each
- Olive oil
- 250g of minced lamb
- 1 medium onion, finely diced
- 2 cloves of garlic, very finely diced or minced
- 4 sun-dried tomatoes (soaked in hot water for ½ hour

if dried)

- 1/2 tsp of dried oregano
- 1/4 tsp of dried rosemary
- Large pinch of cinnamon
- 1 140g tin of tomato purée concentrate
- Juice of 1 lemon
- Salt & pepper
- 50g of sultanas
- 20g of pine nuts
- Handful of finely chopped parsley
- 125g of goats cheese, crumbled

How to make it:

Firstly, cook the rice in slightly salted water, drain and set aside. Now, chop the flower end off the courgettes and reserve. Then using an apple corer, remove the pulpy centre being careful not to break the sides nor pierce the far end of the courgette. You may have to force



the handle of the apple corer inside the courgette to reach right in. Take as much of the pulp out as possible and discard.

Heat the oven to 190C (170C fan)/Gas Mark 5.

In a large frying pan or skillet, heat a little olive oil and fry the minced lamb until lightly browned. Add the onion and garlic and continue to fry until the onion has softened. Finely chop the sun-dried tomatoes and add to the pan with the oregano, rosemary and cinnamon. Stir in the tomato purée and lemon juice. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Remove from the heat. Mix in thoroughly the sultanas, pine nuts, parsley and goats cheese. Fill each courgette with the mixture with a teaspoon, using a wooden spoon handle to push it in. Replace the end of the courgette and hold in place with a cocktail stick.

Bake in the oven for 30 minutes covered with foil and then a further 15 minutes uncovered.


HISTORY GROUP

CHANGES TO THE MOBILE LIBRARY SERVICE

From Hantsweb: "Last October 2010 we announced a review of the Mobile Library Service. Over the last 5 years visits to stops have declined by more than 23%. We know that the people who still use the service value it very highly, but the current financial situation and decrease in use means we have had to consider how to achieve the most effective service for Hampshire communities whilst making significant savings to the running costs. Along with every other service in Hampshire County Council, the Library Service has to make savings of at least 16% over the next two years."

Among many others, the following changes are being made:

- ◆ The current Mobile Library Service will cease on 24 June, and the new service will start on 4 July.
- The number of mobile library stops will reduce from over 1200 to 365.
- Villages at least two miles from the nearest static library will continue to receive a Mobile Library Service. However in most cases the number of stops in each community will be reduced to one, with a minimum stop length of 20 minutes. Most stops will be between 30 and 40 minutes.
- ♦ The frequency of visits will reduce from once every 2 weeks to once every 4 weeks.
- ♦ The number of customers using each stop will be monitored after 12 months. If there are fewer than 10 people per 20 − 40 minute stop then the stop may be withdrawn.



Mobile library stops in this area for the remainder of this year will be on 28th July, 25th August, 22nd September, 20th October, 17th November and 22nd December (all Thursdays), as follows:

1030 - 1100 Dunbridge, Mill Rise

1150 - 1220 Lockerley, Butlers Close
