They have also been served with an Enforcement Notice by the Information Commissioner for calling TPS registered numbers. This was only last August and they are already in serious

breach of this notice, as they foolishly called me yet again (the 7th time). This time they ended up with a wasted trip out here to receive an appropriately worded message to their management!

If any other TPS registered resident has received a call from this company, could you please let me know, as I am in touch with a contact in the Information Commissioner's enforcement department and any additional evidence of illegal calls to other TPS numbers would be very useful.

A new bus route for our village bus

Following a request from a local user the Mottisfont and Broughton Village Bus is planning to run a monthly service to Andover.

The service will start on Wednesday, 27th July, and will be available on the 4th Wednesday of each month. It will pick up in Dunbridge at the car park by Mill Rise at 9.30am, and will return here at 12.55pm. Other pick-ups can be made by arrangement.

The fare will be £4.90 for an adult, £2.45 for under 16yr olds, and of course people can use their bus passes if they have them.

It is initially being run on a six month trial basis from July to December, and is currently awaiting final approval from the licensing authorities. If you would like to know more about this or other details of the Village Bus Service, please give me a ring.

Blooming early...

The roses in the walled garden are two weeks early this year due to the beautiful weather we have had over the past two months. We still have plants yet to flower, but the first walled garden is looking stunning with the sweet scented climbers.

Dear Friends,

If the month of June is anything like May, we should have some lovely sunny weather - the sun, the burning orb in the heavens has certainly blessed us recently. When we have a prolonged dry spell we are also in need of life giving rain which refreshes the earth – both are required, and in the same way following the glorious message of the Resurrection at Easter the Christian is in need of the Holy Spirit to sustain and bring life to the soul. This first giving of the Holy Spirit to God's Church is recorded in the scriptures in the Book of Acts in these words: "When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them".

The Enabling and renewing Holy Spirit came upon the Apostles, fifty days after the Resurrection of Christ, on the ancient Jewish festival called the "feast of weeks" or Pentecost (Exodus 34:22; Deuteronomy 16:10). Whitsunday is so called from the white garments which were worn by those who were baptised during the vigil; Pentecost ("Pfingsten" in German), is the Greek for "the fiftieth" (day after Easter). Whitsunday, as a Christian feast, dates back to the first century. Evidence of this is contained in the seventh of the fragments of writings attributed to St. Irenæus a first century Bishop of the Church.

In Italy it was customary to scatter rose leaves

from the ceiling of the churches to recall the miracle of the fiery tongues; hence in Sicily and

elsewhere in Italy Whitsunday is called Pascha rosatum. The Italian name Pascha rossa comes from the red colours of the vestments used on Whitsunday. In France it was customary to blow trumpets during Divine service, to recall the sound of the mighty wind which accompanied the Descent of the Ghost (has anyone got a trumpet for Sunday Service?). In England the gentry amused themselves with horse races. The Whitsun Ales or merrymakings are almost wholly obsolete in our land...perhaps a shame! At these ales the Whitsun plays were performed. At Vespers of Pentecost in the Oriental Churches the extraordinary service of genuflexion, accompanied by long poetical prayers and psalms, takes place. On Pentecost the Russians carry flowers and green branches in their hands.

Therefore as you can see as we celebrate Pentecost, many others will be doing so in their own unique and interesting ways, but the most important thing is to ask God to fill you with his Holy Spirit and presence and to receive the gift of his new and wonderful life giving Spirit. Pentecost this year is celebrated on 12th June, please do come along to our services in the Benefice and join us for our Pentecost Celebration.

RECEPIE OF THE MONTH: EASY STRAWBERRY TORTE

With Wimbledon and Henley Regatta being held in the latter part of June, a strawberry recipe is what's required – oh, and of course a Pimms! This recipe makes eight servings.

Shopping List: 1 200g ready-made sponge flan

500g of strawberries, hulled 50ml of masala wine or dark sweet sherry 600ml of double cream 500g of mascarpone cheese lcing sugar, sifted

How to make it:

Put the sponge flan case on a flat work surface. Place a 23cm (9 inch) springform tin on top of the flan and with a small, sharp knife, cut around it. Then, with a long, sharp knife, carefully cut through the sponge horizontally to give you two rounds of sponge. Place one half of the sponge neatly at the bottom of the tin and sprinkle with some (not all) of the masala wine, but not too much as to soak.

Next, cut the strawberries in half from top to bottom. Sit the strawberry halves around the inside edge of the tin with the middle of the strawberry facing outwards. Finely chop the remaining strawberries and set aside.

Now whip the cream until it forms soft peaks and then add the mascarpone. Mix well whilst adding the reserved diced strawberries and the remaining masala wine. Add icing sugar to your taste (normally around 3 tablespoons will be enough) and give the mixture a final stir.

Spoon the mixture onto the sponge keeping the strawberry halves in the upright position and up against the side of the tin. Smooth the top of mixture until level. Now carefully place the other half of the sponge on top of the levelled mixture.

Chill in the fridge for a least 4 hours or preferably overnight. Then release the spring from the tin and lift off carefully. Smooth the sides of the torte and dust liberally with icing sugar before serving.
