From 23rd May most Monday to Saturday services to Romsey and Southampton Central will call at Mottisfont & Dunbridge at 14 minutes past the hour instead of the current times. Check the timetable included with this edition of the Acorn for full details.

South West Trains are making the changes to reduce the time trains stand idle at Southampton Central. Services to Salisbury remain unaffected by the changes and will still call at Mottisfont & Dunbridge at times printed in the current timetable.

New passenger information points are now operating at Mottisfont & Dunbridge Station and by the

time you read this, digital passenger information screens should be up and running at Romsey Station.

## PARISH COUNCIL

#### Highways

A number of potholes in the parish reported to Hampshire County Council have been repaired. Please continue to report any new holes to HCC on their website.

Hedge cutting along Hatt Hill and Millennium Walk been felled. has been done, and we have contacted TVBC to clear the cuttings again which are still falling onto the pathway.

We have reported the Kimbridge Crossing again to Network Rail and HCC; the parish council agree with the complaints received from parishioners that the repair completed last year has still left the crossing with a dangerously high bump in the middle of the track.

Are you in housing need or do you know anyone that is? Parish councillors know that this is a serious issue for some people in the parish, but we also think there is a good deal of hidden need. If we can understand how much need there is and what sort of homes might be required in the future, then we have an opportunity, working closely with Test Valley BC and using the Government's new localism agenda to try to change things. This may take time but it's important to make a start.

We want to know

- do you expect to move over the next 5 years or so and would you want to stay in the parish if you could? Will you be looking for affordable rented housing or something to buy and what size home might you need?
- do you have children at home who will be looking for somewhere to rent or buy in the parish possibly in a few years time?
- do you have family or friends living outside the parish but who have had a long association with Mottisfont and Dunbridge and who would like to move back if they could?

This is very important. The parish council and TVBC must get a comprehensive picture of current and future housing need in order to be able to help you and your families. We want to ensure that Mottisfont and Dunbridge stay friendly and lively places in years to come, with enough homes for local people.

In aid of St Andrews Church, Mottisfont

#### Dear Friends,

The month of April brought to us the commemoration of the most incredible happening in human history: the resurrection of Christ from the dead. This one happening changes everything for Christians, for it marks the end of fear and pointlessness to the sheer joy of continuation with God. The Easter season isn't just Easter Sunday. It's 50 days long, and the last of those days is Pentecost, marking the birth of the Church and the coming of the Holy Spirit with power. In that period there are some special times to mark. In most years, the commemoration of certain saints falls in the Easter season: Catherine of Siena (April 29), Monica (Augustine's mother, May 4), Gregory of Nazianzos (May 9), and the gospel author, St. Mark (April 25).

As the last weeks of the Easter season come, Christians mark Ascension Day (2nd June), when Christ left us after His return, telling us to make disciples, and promising to return again to bring His Kingdom to full fruition. The last day of the Resurrection season is Day 50, or Pentecost (Greek for 'fiftieth'). In older English traditions, it's called Whitsunday because the traditional colour for church clothing and decor on Pentecost is white. On that day the Holy Spirit arrives to be with us, and that Spirit sends a fresh wave of joy. On that day, the question of 'what next?' is answered with power - go tell the gospel, heal, teach, serve, love. The Holy Spirit will bring the results. And they went and



did it. If they didn't, I wouldn't have anything to tell you about.

Therefore this month of May is one of great celebration, so have a spring in your step for rightly the Psalmist's cry is applied to this season: "This is the day which the Lord has made: let us rejoice and be glad in it" (Ps 118:24). This invitation to joy, which the Easter liturgy makes its own, reflects the astonishment which came over the women who, having seen the crucifixion of Christ, found the tomb empty when they went there "very early on the first day after the Sabbath" (Mk 16:2). It is an invitation to relive in some way the experience of the two disciples of Emmaus, who felt their hearts "burn within them" as the Risen One walked with them on the road, explaining the Scriptures and revealing himself in "the breaking of the bread" (cf. Lk 24:32,35). And it echoes the joy at first uncertain and then overwhelming - which the Apostles experienced on the evening of that same day, when they were visited by the Risen Jesus and received the gift of his peace and of his Spirit (cf. Jn 20:19-23).

#### Recipe for May: TROUT FILLETS WITH ASPARAGUS & 'EASY HOLLANDAISE'

Make the most of asparagus in May with this light and delicate dish. This recipe serves 4.

Shopping List:

- 4 trout fillets, at least 150g each, skinned & boned
- Olive oil
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1/2 the juice of a small lemon
- 2 large egg yolks
- The other ½ of the juice of a small lemon
- ¼ tsp of smooth French mustard, eg Dijon
- 175g of salted butter
- 16 tender asparagus spears
- Lime wedges to serve

#### How to make it:

Brush the trout fillets with olive oil on both sides and season with salt and pepper. Squeeze the juice of half a lemon over the fillets.

Whisk the egg yolks, the other half of the lemon juice and mustard together in a bowl until pale and well combined.

Heat the butter in a pan until completely melted and foaming vigorously. Add the hot butter to the egg mixture bit by bit,

whisking constantly until the sauce is combined and thickened. Season the sauce with salt and pepper to taste. Keep warm next to the stove or if making in advance, keep in a Thermos flask. Do not attempt to re-heat or the sauce will split, i.e. the butter will separate.

Place the trout fillets under a hot grill for 5 minutes until cooked. Meanwhile, heat a griddle pan coated with oil. Brush the tender part of the asparagus spears with olive oil and season with salt and pepper. (To take just the tender part of the asparagus, hold the stalk at its base and bend it over until it breaks. Discard the woody base.) Cook the asparagus on the griddle pan for 4 to 5 minutes, turning occasionally.

Place 4 asparagus spears at a diagonal on a plate, with the trout fillet on top, and then drizzle the hollandaise sauce over. Garnish with a wedge of lime.

Jersey Royals would make a welcome addition, cooked with fresh mint and smothered in butter!

## JUNK TELEPHONE CALLER PEST: Enterprise Cleaning Services UK Ltd

You may remember in the February Acorn I reported that this company had been illegally telephoning people who are registered with the Telephone Preference Service. As a result of this activity, they have now been formally cautioned and will be prosecuted if these offences are repeated. That <u>should</u> be the end of the matter, but after the BBC's Watchdog exposé and my personal experience of them, I have considerable doubts that they will behave themselves from now on. Therefore, if you are registered with the TPS and you receive any sales calls from this company, can you please let me know the following:

- The date and time you received the call.
- Please confirm the call was from Enterprise Cleaning ('too good to miss' carpet cleaning offer).
- Ask the name of the person who is speaking to you.

Over the last year I have noticed a considerable increase in the number of illegal Telesales calls, and Dorset Trading Standards think this could be a result of the economic downturn. Whatever the reason, telling the caller that you are registered with the TPS and ordering them to delete your number from their database seems to have little effect, as you receive yet another sales call from them a few weeks, or months later.

#### **TPS Registered Volunteers Wanted**

Since Christmas I have been operating a zero tolerance policy and allow the caller to invite themselves out to see me. When they arrive, they are given a message for their boss and a TPS leaflet. This time wasting policy has worked well, except in the case of Enterprise, who have now had two wasted trips out here!

To make this more effective, it would be far better if there were other TPS registered people doing the same thing.

So would anyone be interested in volunteering? I can provide you with a template message and TPS leaflets to hand out, and I would be pleased to discuss this with anyone who is interested.
