#### MIND THE GAP!

Freight traffic on our railways is increasing, and to keep up with this trend, our railway infrastructure is undergoing a number of modifications to allow the use of wider containers.

Network Rail is shortly to begin work at Dunbridge station to reduce the width of the platforms in both directions, each by 75cm (about 30 inches), so the new Euro-style containers can pass through the station.

Network Rail's press release said nothing about difficulties this might cause for passengers using the existing trains, and who will have to negotiate a rather substantial gap.

The *Acorn* contacted their press office for comment: "We have thought of that," said a spokesperson. "and carried out a feasibility study. Passengers disembarking will be asked to take a short run up to the doorway of the train, and our study shows that 97.3% of them should make it safely to the platform. Furthermore, to avoid injury to over-enthusiastic passengers who subsequently crash into the wall on the far side, we will be installing padding along the wall for the full length of the platform."

So that's alright, then.

### Footway works to commence

Work is due to start this month on building the roadside footway between Mottisfont & Dunbridge Station and the layby at Barley Hill opposite Mill Rise. The expected start date is 7th April.

The footway should improve safety for pedestrians using Barley Hill to reach the station and beyond.

Mottisfont Parish Council has campaigned for some time for a roadside footway in this area. It is also putting pressure on Hampshire County Council to complete the missing link in the existing Hatt Hill footway along the B3084 at Mottisfont between the River Dun and Hatt Lane, and also the stretch between Hatt Farm and Benger's Lane at Mottisfont. However, completing this footway is going to cost an estimated £100,000, and Hampshire highway officials say it will require extensive engineering work to implement. But it is an important route linking Mottisfont & Dunbridge Station with the Mottisfont Estate and Abbev.

It is vital that this footway is built not only to make it safer for tourists visiting Mottisfont but also for residents who regularly walk along the B3084 to reach the station and other amenities such as crossfield footpaths, the Mill Arms, the village hall, social club and the church.

# **Mational Trust**

As part of the National Trust's Mottisfont portfolio of properties, our countryside team also manages the northern commons of the New Forest. This includes Bramshaw, Ibsley, Rockford and Hightown Commons, Hale Purlieu and Foxbury. The total area covered by these sites is about 4,000 acres. Our Ranger team, led by Dylan Everett (Countryside Manager), do a superb job, working with volunteers to conserve, protect and enhance these areas for everyone to enjoy.

Foxbury (the other side of Wellow) is a particularly important project. The National Trust bought the site with grant funding in 2005, and since then has been regenerating this area of woodland, overgrown with scrub and rhododendron. Our work here includes the planting of 22,000 new trees, restoring and regenerating ponds, and heathland restoration. Although inside the New Forest National Park, the site is not currently designated SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest), and our aim is to achieve that status, in effecting increasing the SSSI land within the national park for the first time since the 1960s. Heathland is rarer than rain forest and as diversity is so important when it comes to protecting our habitat and environment, the value of this work is massive.

This is all great news for insects, butterflies, birds and reptiles. It's also quite good news for the herd of rare breed cattle that we have introduced for grazing (Belted Galloway and Luing), which people have enjoyed seeing too!

Foxbury has its own events scheduled this year, with walks, talks, cycle events and trails for everyone. If you are interested in joining our Outdoor Ranger team, then just check the website: www.nationaltrust.org.uk/new-forest-northern-commons/things-to-see-and-do/events.

### TEST VALLEY LECTURE: WAR HORSES AND THE REMOUNT SERVICE

Wednesday, 16th April

During the First World War over a million horses were obtained from Britain and North America by the Army Remount Service for military use. The impressive Remount Camp at Romsey could train 5,000 horses for war at any one time. It had a military compliment of 2,100 men, one of whom was Lionel Edwards, the distinguished artist who spent his later years at Buckholt.

The camp had a veterinary hospital and employed many civilians too. Trained horses were shipped to France via the camp at Swaythling. Given that the population of Romsey was only 7,000, this settlement on Pauncefoot Hill, a mile from the town centre, must have been startling.

Phoebe Merrick is chairman of Romsey Local History Society. She has worked and published on Romsey history for 40 years, and has spent the last 4 studying the Remount Camp in depth.





#### KIMBRIDGE RESTAURANT

#### **Indian spiced lamb**

This recipe serves 6 persons.

#### Ingredients:

- 1.5kg diced lamb
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice Salt and pepper
- 100g cashew nuts
- 4 garlic cloves, roughly chopped 7cm piece of root ginger, grated
- 2 tablespoons clear honey
- 1 teaspoon cumin
- 1 teaspoon turmeric
- 1/4 teaspoon of cayenne pepper
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 250g Greek yogurt
- Chopped coriander to garnish

#### How to make it:

Place the yogurt, cinnamon, cayenne pepper, turmeric, honey, lemon juice, ginger, cumin and garlic into a food processor and mix together.

Once blended together, pour the mix over the diced lamb and stir. Then cover the lamb and leave to marinate overnight in the fridge.

After the meat has marinated overnight, place the mix into a saucepan and bring up to the boil stirring occasionally. Then reduce the heat to simmer and leave to cook until the meat is soft and tender, stirring frequently throughout cooking.

Once the meat is soft and tender, the yogurt and spice mix will have reduced and thickened to make the sauce. Now add the cashew nuts and season to taste with the salt and pepper.

Serve with rice and a sprinkling of chopped coriander.
