Trust

This is my final piece for The Acorn, as I'm moving to another role within the National Trust, as Project Director for the Clandon restoration project. You might remember how in April last year, a tragic fire caused a lot of damage to this beautiful National Palladian Mansion, home of the Onslow family for many years. The restoration will be the largest restoration project

undertaken by the National Trust in a generation and whilst I'm looking forward to the new role, I'm very sad to be leaving Mottisfont after 3 years. Louise Govier, who has worked here for many years, will be taking over as Acting General Manager for 6 months, whilst the Trust recruits a permanent replacement.

Mottisfont and Dunbridge is a wonderful, vibrant parish, with so much going on. Many, many people contribute so much, whether that's on the Parish Council, for the church, the numerous local community groups or by supporting the various activities that people who live here value so much. It's been fabulous to be part of and contribute to in some small way.

Our plans for the medium-term future include:

 Restoration of the milking parlour by the roadside, which has been without a roof for some time

• A new BioMass system to heat the house with wood sourced locally. This will reduce Co2 emissions, saving about 90 tonnes annually

• Further work to restore the farm yard in order to make it look better and work more efficiently as a working space

- Replacement of the Mottisfont Lane fence
- Woodland restoration

All of these projects are subject to the necessary consents and funding of course.

Finally, just a note to say that over Easter, the number of visitors to the property can be quite high, so we might need to use our overflow field along Oakley Road. If we do need to do this, we will make sure there are signposts to mark out the route and we do this early to reduce the traffic moving through the village centre. Please do be vigilant though, especially when crossing the road by the old Post Office, as there is likely to be more traffic at this time.

In the gallery...

Thelwell: Ponies and Places, on display until 10th April.

A major exhibition from the family archives of Norman Thelwell, whose popular cartoons of plump girls on ponies are joined by many other satires of twentieth-century life. Less familiar are Thelwell's beautiful paintings of local landscapes – he lived close to Mottisfont and captured the surrounding countryside in a series of stunning watercolours, many of which have never been exhibited before.

The exhibition has proved really popular, especially with local residents, so make sure you catch it before 10 April.

The Schlee Collection: Drawings from Henry Moore to David Hockney, 23 April – 3 July An intriguing exhibition of rarely-seen works by some of Britain's most famous twentieth-century artists. On display will be over 40 drawings and sketches, alongside some of our own contemporary art collection.

This major private collection, on loan from Southampton City Art Gallery, features works by major artists including Henry Moore, Graham Sutherland, Stanley Spencer, Gillian Ayres and David Hockney. Enjoy portraits and landscapes, as well as observational drawings, abstract works and compositional sketches. Drawings for David Breuer-Weil's monumental sculpture Alien, recently installed in Mottisfont's north paddock, will also be on view.

Test Valley Villages Lecture

Wednesday, 20th April, 8pm Broughton Village Hall

The lecture in April is entitled **"Yes, no, or very possibly, Minister: case studies in how British Government works."** The speaker will be Neil Kinghan CB.

Neil Kinghan was a civil servant between 1975 and 2007, ending his Whitehall career as Director General for Local and Regional Government in the Department of Communities. He subsequently acted as chief executive of the Equality and Human Rights Commission in 2009-10, and produced a parliamentary review of the Riot Damages Act in 2013.

Neil Kinghan will talk about the parts played by ministers, civil servants, and those who would influence them, in determining government policy. Is it all based on careful planning, or just reacting to events? Neil will offer four case studies based on issues in which he was involved during three decades: the Hillsborough disaster and football hooliganism in the 1980s; homelessness and rough sleeping in the early 90s; and two recent examples, equalities and human rights and the aftermath of the 2011 riots.

As usual, the cost is £3, including a drink, and all are welcome. No booking is needed.

Can I take this opportunity of wishing you a happy and blessed Easter!



At last we have reached the culmination of our faith as Easter is the greatest feast in the Christian calendar.

On Easter Sunday, Christians celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. Easter Sunday comes at the end of the 40 Lenten days of preparation.

We have travelled through Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, (the day of Jesus' Crucifixion), so that we can rise again with Him in new life at Easter.

Easter is a day of celebration because it represents the fulfillment of our faith as Christians.

St. Paul wrote that, unless Christ rose from the dead, our faith is in vain (1 Corinthians 15:17). Through his death, Christ saved humanity from bondage to sin, and He destroyed the hold that death has on all of us; but it is His Resurrection that gives us the promise of new life, both in this world and the next.

The new life began on Easter Sunday.

In the Lord's Prayer, we pray that "Thy Kingdom come, on earth as it is in Heaven." And Christ told His disciples that some of them would not die until they saw the Kingdom of God "coming in power" (Mark 9:1).

The early Christian Fathers saw Easter as the fulfillment of that promise.

With the resurrection of Christ, God's Kingdom is established on earth, in the form of the Church.

Because of the central importance of Easter to the Christian, it has been a great tradition that all Christians who have been confirmed receive Holy Communion sometime during the Easter Season which lasts through to 50 days after Easter.

Did you know that there are free alternatives to Microsoft Windows and Microsoft Office that are realiable and easy to use? Most computer shops don't sell them because they're...free! There's no profit in that, so advertising is concentrated on products they can charge for. That's why most people have never heard of the alternatives.

The replacement for Microsoft Windows that I'm referring to is called Linux. There are many different variants of Linux, but a good one for people familiar with Microsoft Windows is called Ubuntu. The computer used to compose the Acorn runs Ubuntu, and uses a free desktop publishing application called plenty of information online to help you with this, or if Scribus. KIMBRIDGE RESTAURANT

Roast spring lamb with red currant and red wine jus

This recipe serves 6

Ingredients

2¼kg leg lamb, bone in 75ml olive oil

1 tablespoon chopped rosemary 2 large carrots, roughly chopped 1 white onion, roughly chopped 3 sticks celery, roughly chopped Small sprigs of bay, thyme and rosemary

1 punnet redcurrants 1 tsp plain flour Kate Buchan, Sous Chef at Kimbridge Restaurant

500ml lamb stock 1 tablespoon redcurrant jelly

 $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle red wine

How to make it

Pre heat the oven to 180°C, conventional 200°C, gas mark 6.

Criss-cross the top and sides of the lamb with a knife, making shallow incisions.

Mix half the olive oil with the rosemary, salt and pepper and set aside.

Place the roasting tin over a medium heat and warm the lamb fat with the remaining olive oil for a few seconds. Rub the rosemary oil over the top of the lamb and into the slashes. Keep turning the lamb over in the hot oil until it begins to colour all over.

Tip the vegetables and sprigs of herbs into the tin, sprinkle the lamb with a little extra salt and roast in the oven for 50 minutes or until the outside fat starts to brown. Remove the tin from the oven and turn the temperature down to fan 140°C, conventional 160°C, gas mark 4.

Scrape the vegetables away from the bottom of the tin and turn the lamb over. Baste with a little of the fat, then continue to roast for a further 45-50 minutes. Test by inserting a metal skewer into the thickest part of the leg: for medium-rare meat, the tip should feel warm to the touch and the juices that run out of the meat should be fairly pink.

Remove the lamb to a warmed serving dish and cover with a loose tent of foil. This will prevent heat escaping and will allow the lamb to relax while the gravy is made.

skim away all but 1 tbsp of the fat. Sprinkle the flour in and stir constantly.

Add the wine and stock and boil rapidly for about 10 minutes until the gravy thickens, colours, and is reduced by about half. Taste and add salt and pepper if necessary.

Finally, stir in the redcurrant jelly and simmer until melted, then strain and add the red currants just before serving the lamb. Serve the lamb surrounded by any reserved vegetables, with the hot gravy.
