Mottisfont declares UDI!

In a shock vote, representatives of the parish of Mottisfont have just decided unanimously to declare independence from Hampshire.

Following the trends set by Brexiteers, the Scottish Nationalists, and the new US president, an anonymous spokesperson explained further, "If they can do it, so can we. We want our parish back! We're going to build a wall right round Mottisfont. And what's more, Awbridge, Lockerley and Broughton are going to pay for the construction."

Another resident said that it was a bit reminiscent of the 1949 British comedy film Passport to Pimlico, but said that the wall could be a real bonus, keeping the deer off his roses.

"Mottxit means Mottxit", said the spokesperson, "so this will all go ahead straight away, on the 1st of April".

Greetings all,

Well, Spring has now sprung at the Abbey, and we're awash with daffodils and other lovely bulbs. The Winter Garden is still looking beautiful, and at the time of writing the chinodoxa are providing a beautiful blue carpet along the Lime Walk, so we're enjoying lots of

colour around the grounds. The new Spring menu is launched in the café this week too, with lovely seasonal dishes to whet the appetite. Our Plant Centre is also filling up with interesting things, so do pop in to see if there's anything that would work in your garden.

Some new interpretation inspired by Maud Russell's war diaries will open on the historic floor of the house this week, as well as in the Stables (where evacuees were homed) and in Spearywell Woods. where Mrs. Russell mentions seeing Italian Prisoners of War. Her granddaughter Emily Russell is hugely grateful to all the local people who helped her to fill in gaps in her knowledge as she was editing the diaries and writing the foreward, and we similarly add our thanks – we've now got so much more information to share with our visitors. The book itself was published on 22 March as 'A Constant Heart: the War Diaries of Maud Russell 1938-1945', by The Dovecote Press, and we'll have copies for sale in our shop.

We're also getting ready for Easter- in terms of reflections about new life, chocolate bunnies and of course, car parks! Looking at the moisture levels in the ground, I think we're unlikely to have overflow car parks in operation, but we'll see. We are marking out individual bays in our main car park to encourage efficient parking, and employing car parkers at peak times.

We are also getting the message out there to our visitors that we'll have our Easter trail in operation for the whole of the holidays, asking them to avoid the busiest times of the holiday weekend if at all possible and to come on other days. We will close entrance to the property if the car park becomes full, and will ask visitors not to queue along the road. As ever, we will liaise with our local PCSOs over the Easter period. We are working on a longer term project to improve the design of our main car park, so that visitors park as efficiently as possible all the time.

Hope to see you soon, whether it's at the Abbey, on the wider estate or in the New Forest.

Get recycling and make your home shine this spring

Spring has sprung and thoughts may be turning to spring cleaning. With a little bit of planning, the whole family can get involved and follow these handy hints to make your spring clean run smoothly.

Get started by preparing some boxes and bags to collect unwanted items in. Separate items that can be recycled in your brown bin from items that can be recycled at a Local Recycling Centre. Put items you want to donate to charity in one bag and have a bag for any waste that cannot be recycled.

Garages and sheds are often a home for the things that we think might come in handy. Many of the items are never used again, so why not make some space and get recycling? Break down empty cardboard boxes, dig out empty deicer cans and part with plastic bottles. All can be put in your brown bin and recycled giving you space for the important things.

If you have a bulging wardrobe but still cannot find anything to wear, now is the time to make some space and pass them on for someone else to enjoy. Unwanted clothes and shoes can be taken to a Local Recycling Centre. Many also have collection points for unwanted books, CDs and DVDs. To find your nearest Local Recycling Centre visit www.recyclenow.com/local-recycling.

Sorting out a toy box or cupboard is a great way of getting children involved in the clean-up too. It can highlight the toys that do get played with, and means that once loved toys can go to a new home. Toys that are clean and in good condition can be donated to most charity shops. The Salvation Army also accept toys in their Local Recycling Centre collection banks.

Toilet Twinning and Bright Hour's Christmas Appeal




Andy Comley goes back to his roots

Singer-songwriter Andy Comley has moved out of his usual venues and headed back to his roots, by embarking on a tour of rural halls.

Having played on three continents and supported some of the UK's top singer-songwriters such as

Boo Hewerdine (Eddie Reader), Emily Barker, and Amy Wadge (Ed Sheeran), Andy explained why he has now set his sights closer to home.

"I believe in community, and arts provision for all, and I understand that the local hall can be an important place for people to meet and create social



ties," said the 47 year old, who grew up in the sleepy Hampshire village of Owslebury.

However he also has artistic reasons for moving out of the town.

"I want an intimate atmosphere for my music, where there's no distraction, and the audience can focus and be transported musically, and I've found it in

small rural halls."



The gigs are sit down, lights out, spotlight on affairs, and Andy says that this format makes for an immersive evening for the audience and performer alike. "People have been responding really well, and we've had some really great feedback."

Often likened to Neil Young, Andy has been called passionate and a

poet, and of his last album, Verity Sharpe (Radio 3's Late Junction) said "I love it".

Andy will be playing with double bassist Dave Bulbeck at West Grimstead Village Hall on **Saturday 6th May**.

Illegal Unsolicited Phone Calls

Do you know how many of these you receive in a month? Probably far more than you think!

This is a breakdown of calls logged on our 'Truecall' call blocker unit over the last month.

Total calls received: 68
Dodgy 'International' calls: 24
Dodgy 'Withheld' number calls: 21
Dodgy calls from false numbers: 10

Actual genuine calls: 13

So out of the 68 attempts to call us, our phone only rang for these 13 genuine calls!

Calls from false numbers are a relatively new problem and may need further explanation, as a number comes up on Caller Display giving the impression that it is call from a genuine number and safe to answer. Many of these seem to be recorded messages telling you that you are eligible for a free boiler grant (I wish!) and suggest you call another number, which is not a good idea!

It's much the same for us. We use a BT8500 cordless phone with a call blocker built in, and in the last three weeks it blocked 35 calls identified as international or number withheld. Such callers can leave a message, but they very seldom do. -Eds.


