Speed Enforcement in Dunbridge

On 22nd May, a police Speed Enforcement Van went into action near the top of Barley Hill.

Following complaints from local residents about traffic speed, Mottisfont Parish Council had sent a request to the Police and Crime Commissioner, who responded to the Council's concerns.



The operator of the van said that the intention was to return later in the week, and again a number of times over the next few months.

The van is quite conspicuous, and quite a lot of sharp braking could be seen, especially by cars coming down the hill. It's not known how many people were caught, but a motorcycle was seen overtaking another vehicle and passing the police van at considerably more than 30mph.

Waste Dumping and Fly-tipping

There have been a number of problems recently with illegal dumping of waste. A case in point is an assortment of household waste which was dumped at the glass recycling point in the car park of the Mill Arms. Recycling points may only be used to deposit the materials specified on the containers; other items must be disposed of at the proper facilities.

Waste is defined as any substance or object which the holder discards or intends to discard.

The Environmental Protection Act makes it an offence to deposit waste not in accordance with a continued on page 7

Our Countryside rangers Cat and Ryan recently planted this youngster within sight of the 'mother tree', so that even when the majestic ancient oak comes to the end of its life, its genetic material will live on nearby. Rose season - Throughout June It's that time of year again. Our walled gardens are filled with heavenly fragrance and colour from thousands of flowers as the National Collection of old-fashioned roses put on their spectacular display.

Unlike modern species, old-fashioned roses tend to flower just once a year, so their full summer

blooming is an extraordinary annual sight. The roses are surrounded by deep herbaceous borders, which provide changing displays from June - October. The borders are packed with plants chosen for their structure, scent and wide colour palette.

Join one of our garden team from 2-3pm daily throughout June as they answer your gardening auestions.

On some evenings during June, our gardens stay open a little later, giving you more opportunities to enjoy this experience. On Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays 8th - 10th, 15th - 17th and 22nd - 24th June our gardens will be open up until 8pm (last entry into property 7pm, house closes at normal time of 5pm).

In the gallery...

Discovering Britain: the Shell Heritage Art Collection Saturday 6 May – Sunday 2 July 11am – 5pm Iconic landscape images that promoted escape and adventure from the 1920s to the 1950s. On show will be posters and original paintings by artists such as Paul Nash. Graham Sutherland. Edward McKnight Kauffer and Vanessa Bell, some of whom feature in Mottisfont's own collection.

The works reflect a diversity of artistic styles emerging in Britain after the First World War, and explore the British countryside through images of inspiring landscapes and historic landmarks. The exhibition also includes some of the famous Shell guides, valentine cards and film.

waste management licence. Magistrates can impose a sentence of up to 12 months in prison and/or an unlimited fine for such an offence.

Illegal deposits of waste should be reported to Test Valley Borough Council, either online or using one of their mobile phone apps.

Did you know?

Householders have a duty of care to ensure that their waste is properly disposed of, and are required by law to check that anyone removing waste from their property is authorised to do so. If you use a private contractor to remove household, garden or construction waste, ensure that they are a registered waste carrier, and keep a record of their waste carrier number.
