# Maud Russel's Diaries

The publication of Maud Russell's diaries is of considerable importance. Few diaries covering the Second World War remain unpublished, even less weave together so many strands; politics, art, high society, wartime life on a country estate, the unfolding drama of the war itself – the last brought into sharper focus by Maud's struggle to help her Jewish relatives flee Nazi Germany.

Together with her husband Gilbert, Maud's principal home was Mottisfont Abbey in Hampshire, described by John Julius Norwich in his foreword as 'the most desirable house in England', and which she later gave to the National Trust.

Emily Russell, Maud's granddaughter said that the diaries mention quite a lot about life in the village during World War 2.

The daughter of German immigrants, Maud was an outsider who owed her place in society to her wealth and marriage. To many she was an enigma, but the diaries reveal a woman of strong emotion with an immense appetite for life. The opening entries alone hint at the riches that lie ahead. There is a meeting in Paris with Matisse (who painted her), an anxious visit to Cologne shortly after Kristallnacht, the commissioning of Rex Whistler to decorate the 'big room' at Mottisfont with the trompe l'œil murals for which the house is now famous, and a deepening intimacy with Ian Fleming, almost certainly her lover – as in due course was the Russian mosaic artist Boris Anrep, whom she shared with his common-law wife.

Despite Maud's determination to

Eighteen people from the village attended, and Paul spent just over an hour showing us how the defibrillator is used.

His message was that it is not difficult, and you do not have to remember anything, as the defibrillator will talk you through what to do.

Use of the defibrillator is combined with CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation), and it was useful to have a reminder of how this is done, in case there is no defibrillator available to instruct you.

The snowdrops are making their annual lovely appearance around the grounds and on the wider estate - always so nice to see them after it's been so cold and horrible. National The gardens team are planning to plant lots more within the grounds down by the river for next year, so we'll have even bigger drifts of them

by 2018. The winter garden is still looking beautiful, with the bright dogwood stems glowing from afar. Do pop in for a stroll if you've got time.

The House and Visitor Experience teams are hard at work on some interpretation to bring to life extracts from Maud Russell's war diaries around the house and further afield. I know that several local people spoke to Emily Russell, her granddaughter, when she was over from Chile doing some research, and she was most grateful. It's a lovely book, full of interesting information about her life here and in London during the war. We'll be telling various parts of her story around the house, and will be sharing John Clarke's memories of being an evacuee here in the Stables. The book is launched on 22 March, and we'll open the new interpretation then.

Meanwhile, the Rex Whistler exhibition is attracting lots of interest, and we're preparing for the next show: some lovely posters and original artwork created for the 'Discovering Britain' campaign by Shell from the 1930s onwards. It's all about using the freedom of the road to discover Britain's beautiful landscape and hidden heritage, and we're thrilled to have not just the pictures but also John Betjemen's 1950s films about places to explore. There are also all sorts of objects including early forecourt gift 'giveaways', and some of the Valentine's cards that Shell sent to their female customers.

Our countryside teams have been reviewing how many rare species have increased their numbers as we've been improving their habitat, which is really brilliant to hear. Southern Damsel Flies, bats, rare butterflies and smooth snakes are all thriving – don't worry, the latter are out in the New Forest, and don't pose any danger to you at home!

And the list of those friends is to call the roll on British political and artistic life in the mid-twentieth century, many of whom are brought vividly to life in diaries which, until edited by her granddaughter for publication, have remained private and unpublished.

A Constant Heart, The War Diaries of Maud Russell 1938-1945, is being published on 22nd March, and will cost £20. Copies signed by Emily Russell and bought in advance of publication will be available at that price, inclusive of all post and packing.

## Annie's Kitchen and Tea Room

### Recipe of the Month: Chocolate Brownies

### Ingredients

200g dark chocolate 100g unsalted butter, very soft 250g caster sugar 4 large free range eggs, beaten to mix 1tsp vanilla essence 60g plain flour 60g cocoa powder

### Method

Heat the oven to 180C, gas 4. Break up the dark chocolate. Put it into a heatproof bowl and melt it gently in a pan over simmering water, making sure the water doesn't touch the base of the bowl. Then remove the bowl from the heat and leave to cool until needed.

Put the butter and sugar into the bowl of a food mixer and beat until fluffy. Gradually beat in the eggs, beating well after each addition. Beat in the vanilla essence.

Spoon the cooled melted chocolate onto the mixture, then mix in thoroughly. Sift the flour and cocoa powder onto the mixture and gently stir in. When completely combined, spoon the mixture into the prepared tin (15cm square brownie tin or baking tin greased and base-lined) and spread evenly.

Bake in the heated oven for about 20 minutes until firm to the touch but still a bit fudgy. Chocolate brownies are meant to be gooey in the middle, so don't be tempted to leave them in for longer. Remove the tin from the oven and set on a wire cooling rack. The chocolate will continue to cook slightly for a few minutes after coming out of the oven. Leave the chocolate brownies to cool completely before cutting into pieces.

Store the brownies in an airtight container and eat within 4 days.

(When I say home made I really do mean home made: it is made from roasted veal bones, wine, roasted vegetables, herbs, salt and pepper and then reduced to a smooth silky gravy.)

Our Sunday roast has been such a success that we have now introduced it as a mid-week roast, available every Wednesday. It is a big hit.

Also on Friday and Saturday evening we have introduced our pop-up restaurant with a theme, from 6.30pm until 11pm, where the theme of the food changes each week. For instance, summer will be more tapas, Spanish, Mexican, Italian themed. Winter will be great British, French and Indian with classic hearty dishes.
