Greetings from Mottisfont!

It's all feeling very autumnal here at the moment; the leaves are looking gorgeous and we've had some National beautiful days for strolling about enjoying them. Do pop in if you've time, it's just lovely at the moment!

Behind the scenes, we're starting on a few projects for which we've just had planning permission granted, or which we've been wanting to do for a while. We'll soon start work on replacing the boundary fence along the lane from Hazel Cottage to the visitor car park. I'm sorry, I had really hoped that we could perhaps move this fence back a little to give pedestrians more room, but for a number of reasons that's just not possible (not least because the ground slopes steeply away in parts, and there are some very large trees and a river in the way). As the road is so narrow, the contractors will need to apply for a temporary road closure to do the work, but this will be in place only during off-peak day-time hours, and not at weekends or during holidays. It will take approximately two weeks to complete.

Next is our waste water project in the farmyard, where we're replacing three elderly septic tanks with a combined eco-friendly treatment system that will take waste water (including sewage) from visitor areas in the walled garden, a couple of residential properties and staff and volunteer areas, and clean and treat it to a very high standard, in accordance with an Environment Agency permit. Don't worry, it all happens underground in carefully controlled environments, so there won't be any smells! There will be some excavating work needed here, but we'll keep noise, disturbance and traffic to a minimum.

We're also creating a new composting area with dividing bays to enable batch management, and surface drainage to capture nutrient rich liquid that can be used as plant food. This will enable all of the green waste from the property (and also small quantities of cardboard and kitchen waste) to be composted for use in the garden, essential for mulching, disease control and soil improvement.

Head Gardener Jonny Norton and his team are set to start work on transforming the frameyard (for many years our car park) back into a productive garden, inspired by both the Abbey's history and its historic use for growing fruit and vegetables. There will be a series of brick and flint raised beds planted with mixed vegetables, cut flowers, herbs and roses; cold frames and long pergola walkways draped with climbing gourds, beans and vines will provide interest at different times of year. A central dipping pond will be surrounded by four lawns, each with a rill running through it so that the gentle sound of water is never far away (just as well we're doing the

sewage project and refurbishing the loos, I hear you say!).

We will move our nursery and propagation area into the farmyard, near the new compost area, enabling us to open the whole of the frameyard for visitors. We'll also be opening up part of Top Lodge for visitors to explore, with displays and interactive materials so that people of all ages can find out more about the history of the rose and the fascinating story of our walled garden. The historic route into the frameyard next to Top Lodge will also be opened for visitors, giving stunning views through into the central rose garden.

We aim to have the sewage project complete by the end of February, and the garden ready in time for rose season next year. There's a viewing area to watch the garden works as they happen, so do come and see what's going on.

Chestnut trees lining the upper half of our main pathway glow with yellow-orange leaves. Two tulip trees also come into their own during this season, as their acid green summer foliage turns a magnificent pale gold. A fresh walk through the gardens offers opportunities to take in these stunning sights. Take a stroll along the river, where the crystal clear waters of the Test reflect the colours of the season. We offer daily guided walks, too - just chat to one of our outdoor guides to find out what's on offer when you visit.

The Moving Story of Remembrance

Speaker Major General (ret'd) Patrick Cordingley

Before the 1st World War our soldiers killed in foreign fields tended to be buried in mass graves and hardly remembered at home. All this changed during the 1st World War. Patrick Cordingley will relate how and why this happened, why there is the Cenotaph, as well as the two minutes silence. He will bring the story up to date by explaining the establishment of the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire.

Patrick's military career took him to the highest levels of the army, and since retiring he has been a consultant, broadcaster, author, and a commentator who is not afraid of controversy. He is now Chairman of the Defence and Security Forum and the National Memorial Arboretum Appeal. We are delighted to welcome Patrick back following his thought provoking talk about the Iraq conflict.



sportsfield in Buckholt Road, where the bonfire will be lit at approximately 6.45pm.


The firework display will commence around 7.30pm and will last about 20 minutes.
