Dear friends and neighbours,

Spring is just around the corner – we already have snowdrops appearing around the Abbey, and we're awaiting National the blooming of thousands of new bulbs that were put in by the river in the snowdrop walk that Gary and his volunteers created last autumn.

They've made a lovely bark path that snakes through the flowers, and it's going to be a beautiful spot for a walk this year.

Work continues on installing the new eco-friendly waste water treatment unit in the farmyard, and on starting the construction of the new ornamental kitchen garden in the framevard, the first section of the walled garden. It will also begin to tell the story of our beautiful rose collection, and we can't wait to see the designs start coming to life on the ground.

The decorators are hard at work all over the Abbey, refreshing the paint on the walls of the Coach House Café, the West Corridor of the house, and also the gallery. All the lovely colours that we added to the walls for the Kaffe Fassett exhibition have been put back to more neutral tones (I'm a bit sad about that, but I'll get over it!), and by the time this edition of Acorn is published, we'll have opened our latest exhibition, Heath Robinson: Dreams and Machines. It features some wonderfully comic drawings of contraptions by the great inventor of unnecessary devices, as well as showcasing his beautiful book and magazine illustrations and the landscapes that he painted for pleasure.

Hopefully also by the time this appears, our contractors will have been able to start work replacing the boundary fence that runs through the village. At the time of writing, they are awaiting permission for a temporary road closure from the council; as there were several others requested by other people before Christmas, quite understandably they've said that we need to wait a little while so that local residents have a break in between works that require off-peak road closures.

At a national level, we've welcomed the news that Hilary McGrady has been appointed new Director-General of the National Trust. She will take over in March from Dame Helen Ghosh who, after six years with us, and having put in place an ambitious ten year strategy, is going to be Master of Balliol College in Oxford.

Hilary is currently the Trust's Chief Operating Officer, so is responsible for the care and operation of all of our properties. Originally trained in graphic design, Hilary's career path started in the drinks industry in brand and marketing. In 1998, she moved to become director of a national arts charity and was

subsequently seconded in 2002 to become CEO of Belfast's bid to become European Capital of Culture. A two year return to the private sector as cultural tourism consultant preceded her move to the National Trust, where she has been Regional Director in Northern Ireland, Wales and London & South East before her current national role. She has visited Mottisfont many times, and will I'm sure be back to see us again soon.

That's it for now - I hope everyone's recovering from this winter's horrible colds and 'flu, and that we'll see you for a stroll through the snowdrops soon.

From quirky machinery to exquisite watercolours, this exhibition showcases the wit and talent of this household name. In the 1930s, Heath Robinson became known as "The Gadget King", and he is still most widely remembered for his detailed drawings of eccentric, over-complicated contraptions. But he was also a talented painter, trained at the Royal Academy. Our exhibition features over 60 works covering the extraordinary breadth of his work, from humourous magazine illustrations to dream-like watercolour landscapes and scenes from Shakespeare.

Sunday April 15th Sunday May 20th Sunday June 17th


The services begin at 6 pm and last for half an hour, with refreshments afterwards.



Test Valley Villages Lecture Wednesday 21st February at 8pm Broughton Village Hall

The history and cultures of the Plains Indian Tribes of North America by Sue Dewey

One of the most common images of Native American people in popular American culture is that of the Plains culture, with its fierce warriors, sacred Sun Dance ceremonies, horsemanship, tipi and buffalo hunting.

What is the history of these tribes? What was it like to live as a member of one of them?

This talk, given by Sue Dewey, will give an intimate insight into the history and way of life of the Northern Plains Native American Tribes, focusing mainly on the Teton or Lakota Sioux. It will be well illustrated with authentic Native American clothing and artefacts.

Sue has been presenting talks as well as running courses and workshops on American Indian tribal histories and cultures since 1994. Her content is entirely authentic and is based on many years of study, long standing friendships with Native American people of different tribes and frequent travel across the Northern Plains States of America where she has stayed on the reservations. Over the years she has met native people from all walks of life and this has contributed to her understanding of the many and diverse cultures of Native Americans.

PROTECTING YOUR PRIVACY

In May, new regulations come into force that will enhance your privacy by controlling the way that organisations deal with your personal information. Even the *Acorn* is going to be affected by the new regulations, and this means that we must have explicit approval from everyone whose personal details, such as email addresses and phone numbers, we publish.

This means that if, for example, you ask us to add someone's name and phone number to an article (or the Who's Who) when they join a committee, we can't do it without their direct and explicit consent, preferably in writing.

At the *Acorn*, we're already gearing up to be ready for the new regulations. It's a bit more work for us, and a tiny bit more for our contributors, but we think we should all be able to take it in our stride.
