Local Food Suppliers

Here are details of some local food suppliers:

Broughton Community Shop, located in the newly refurbished village hall, is open 9am to 1pm and 2pm to 4pm on weekdays, and 9am to 12.30pm on Saturdays and Sundays. They sell local produce, essentials and treats, fresh and frozen goods, wine and spirits, cigarettes, newspapers and magazines. They do not do deliveries.

The Fish and Chip Van comes to Mill Rise in Dunbridge on the first and third

DUNBRIDGE VILLAGE GATEWAY

Highway engineers will soon be completing the village gateway feature on Barley Hill at Dunbridge.

Mottisfont Parish Council is behind the trafficcalming initiative, aimed at reducing vehicle speeds on the southern approaches to the built-up area of Dunbridge. Fencing-style panels will be added to the white structure already in place, and it is hoped this work will be finished within the next couple of months.

A different team from Hampshire's highways contractor, Skanska, will be installing a new red antiskid surface at the gateway entrance, along with white line markings.

New specially designed Dunbridge nameplates carrying the 'please drive carefully' message have already been erected on the outskirts of the community and at the gateway itself. These were also paid for by the Parish Council, and are part of a wider on-going project to improve safety on the highway throughout its patch.

Greetings from Mottisfont Abbey!

I'm writing this on a beautiful warm and sunny September day, very different from the very heavy rains we had in August accompanied by such high winds we had to keep a keen eye on whether to shut the site completely to visitors. The grounds are starting to

feel autumnal with very atmospheric mists in the morning, our fruit trees laden with apples and pears and leaves starting to turn. Our seasonal cakes made from all this glorious fruit have also gone down really well!

Visitor numbers have been steady throughout September and August. The success of the booking system has been variable. We found that visitors were booking multiple slots over several days - sort of 'spread betting' their visit in relation to the weather, and then not cancelling the slots they didn't need, but it has helped to even out the flow of visitors throughout the day.

The booking system will remain in place for the foreseeable future, but we have also been asked by the central office to also start accepting people who have not booked if we have the capacity. At the moment our top priority is to keep our staff and visitors safe throughout the Coronavirus pandemic, so we have a maximum capacity limit determined by the main carpark that we will not exceed. Staff are following enhanced hygiene routines across all parts of the business and are never far from hand gel and other sanitising equipment. Visitors are asked to wear face masks in all indoor spaces, including visitor reception, the café and the shop.

We are looking to open the house over the autumn and winter in a few weeks time, and also the bookshop, again with enhanced safety measures such as one way systems, hand sanitizers, and restrictions on numbers in line with social distancing. With Coronavirus on the rise again however, we all understand that it may all be a bit 'stop-start' this autumn and winter, and we check government and National Trust guidelines regularly! Many of our staff meanwhile remain on furlough until the government scheme comes to an end at the end of October.

As some of you will have heard, we have also had to contend with four break-ins in July and August, we think by the same gang. The first was in our farmyard barn, where our storage systems fortunately prevented our 'visitors' from getting anything of value. Our woodyard was also targeted. A few weeks later the gang also tried to break into our small New Forest depot before they returned to the farmyard barn again armed with more serious kit including angle grinders. Fortunately they were seen and reported at Burgate, and also heard at the

farmyard by our fantastic neighbours, who reported them to the police. A huge thanks to all involved; your actions were very much appreciated by all of us, and especially our countryside and gardening teams.

According to the NFU, rural crime is at its highest level for 8 years, and is being driven by targeted and organised criminal gangs. Please do take extra care to secure your own outdoor properties, be vigilant, and do report anything suspicious – but as these incidents are organised and targeted, do call the police rather than doing anything that would put you in harm's way.

On top of all of this, our countryside team has also been super busy this summer dealing with fly tipping across all of our sites, another pernicious type of rural crime. In addition, rural car parks like those on our estate often become targeted. The reports we have mainly involve in-car theft (bags, etc.), so please take care. The rangers do advise all car park users not to leave objects in parked cars if at all possible.

Louise and I have both reported on the impacts of Coronavirus on the National Trust's financial position, and the launch of the 'Reset Programme' which involves a restructure of staff and budgets to ensure that the Trust is able to weather the effects of the pandemic sustainably. The proposals do very sadly include redundancies and also fewer hours available to those people who work for us on a more flexible basis. We will be able to communicate more detail in later editions of the Acorn once the proposals are confirmed in October.

Log sales suspended this year

Unfortunately another service that I know many of you use and value is our log sales. The countryside team is working on essential tasks only while staff are on furlough, and as a result of this we will not be able to supply or deliver logs this year. Our apologies for the inconvenience this will cause, but we hope this leaves you plenty of time to find alternative supplies this year before the cold winter weather sets in.

In the gardens...

Our gardens are ablaze with colour in October. The veteran Great Plane framing the east side of the house boasts a particularly dazzling autumn display. Chestnut trees lining the upper half of our main pathway glow with yellow-orange leaves, and the acid green summer foliage of our tulip trees turns a magnificent pale gold. While we weren't able to fill our Kitchen Garden with produce as normal this year, there are still some displays of scented herbs in raised beds.

To help keep everyone safe, please follow social distancing and government guidance when you visit our gardens. There are one-way routes for the walled gardens (with some small areas closed off), the river walk and the meadow. The winter garden and font stream pathway remain closed for now.

You may find that our gardens aren't quite as you're used to seeing them. We had few gardeners in the property during lockdown, while everyone else stayed home and stayed safe, so the gardens aren't perhaps as well-groomed as you might be expecting, with some weeds and rough edges. We are gradually welcoming our staff and volunteers back, so please bear with us while we work through this, and we hope that you can still enjoy the seasonal pleasures our grounds still have to offer.

From the Rector

At the start of October, the Church is looking forwards to some of the feasts and festivals in the Christian calendar later in the year, and how we will be able to mark them. Christmas is a particular conundrum, and until the course of the pandemic is clearer it is difficult to know what will be possible. Remembrance events this year will necessarily need to focus on the war memorials in our communities rather than church services, which will enable them to be held outdoors and allow more people to participate.

As we all know, being flexible and willing to adapt are essential virtues at the moment. Hence, in church life we have had to do many things differently. One change over the summer unrelated to Covid was the choice to focus preaching and teaching on St. Paul's letter to the Romans, which was set as one of the readings during these months anyway. I am grateful to those of you who have taken the time to express your views on the experience of learning in a bit more depth about one of the texts that was instrumental in shaping our faith, the person who wrote it, and what it has to teach us in our own modern day.

You will notice from the list of church services that we will no longer be holding online services on "Zoom" in favour of in-person worship in the evenings. I am grateful to everyone who has taken the time to tell me what they thought of the on-line service experience. Both it and in-person worship with restrictions are not entirely satisfactory, but such has been in impact of Covid on our lives and practice of our faith.

At the start of next month (2nd November) we will be marking All Souls Day, when we will be remembering and giving thanks for the lives of those who have died during the year. This year will be particularly poignant
