But, considering the staff and volunteer levels are still low due to the pandemic, the garden team have to be congratulated!

And should you still have gaps in the garden borders, or fancy creating a wildlife friendly garden, you will be pleased to hear that the Plant Centre and shop are now open and restocked with lots of seasonal products, plants and gardening equipment.

As well as the gardens being open, so is the house. It's great to finally open those big doors to welcome our visitors and share the collection and legacy of Maud Russell. We are currently showcasing the centenary of the artist Joan Eardley, by highlighting three paintings of Eardley's that we own as part of the Derek Hill Collection.

The house opening times have now changed. Should you wish to visit the house, we are open Wednesday to Sunday (closed Monday and Tuesdays). This will be the normal arrangement until the gallery space is open, and we revert to seven day opening.

To visit Mottisfont, especially in June, I highly recommend booking. The booking slots go live every Friday for the following week. We are still operating with limited visitor numbers through the online booking system. Our opening times will be 10am till 5pm; no early morning openings or late evenings. We still have to follow government guidance, therefore a one-way system will be in operation throughout the walled gardens.

We have a lot to look forward to in the summer. Once the roses go over, the borders and lavender in the central and north walled gardens become a vivid purply-blue haze - the scent is delectable! The

gallery space will reopen with an exhibition of classic Ladybird original illustrations from the iconic 'What can you see in summer' books, with an outdoor exhibition of the modern day book images in the Beech Circle. Families can take part in the summer trail and hopefully, the children's play equipment will be refurbished and open.

## Summer Highlights

### In the gardens...

Our walled gardens are filled with heavenly fragrance and colour from thousands of roses in early summer. We're home to the National Collection of pre-1900 old-fashioned roses, which reach their peak in June.

We're anticipating a later season this year, with the gardens looking their best in the first weeks of June.

In the gallery...

#### A British Summerscape – from the Ladybird Book collection 24th July to 5th September, 11am – 5pm

Original watercolours, created by one of Britain's foremost wildlife artists for the Ladybird book classic 'What to Look for in Summer', are on show from 24th July to 5th September.

First published in 1960, Charles Tunnicliffe's beautifully detailed artworks reflect the plants and wildlife of a summer season in the countryside swallows swooping gracefully over farmland on the hunt for insects, a watervole hiding on the river's edge, an adder basking in sun-warmed dunes.

Blown up sections of the illustrations cover Mottisfont's gallery walls, creating a feeling of immersion, as if stepping into the pages of the book itself.

Outside, in the gardens' beech tree circle, a unique outdoor gallery space has been created to host local artist Natasha Durley's digital illustrations for the new Ladybird edition of 'What to Look for in Summer'.

Published 60 years after Tunnicliffe's originals, their fresh, contemporary style aims to bring a new curiosity and awareness of nature to the next generation of Ladybird readers. This is the very first time that both sets of illustrations have been on display together.

## From the Rector

#### **Funerals**

Last month I wrote about weddings, but this month I find myself moved to write instead about funerals. I find it curious that my attitude towards funerals tends to be sharply at odds with most other people's. While I see them as an everyday feature of daily life, most of the people I speak to about them consider their very existence to problematic. "I have a funeral" often elicits the response "O dear, I am sorry". Really – it is my job! Don't be sorry!

I mention funerals because, curiously, the last couple of months I have been busier with funerals than since I first arrived here in the Test Valley. Funerals always used to come in a reasonably steady stream, with a post-Christmas rush and a slight up-tick during the winter. However, in these covid-times funerals are highly seasonal, with a large workload during times of widespread disease and respite as the NHS is again able to cope with the situation, and the hospitals return to normal. However, I cannot account for the current rush to the grave here in the Test Valley.

This past Monday (17th May) saw a lifting of the restrictions on the number of people who can attend a funeral, although venues still need to ensure distancing. Not enabling grieving families to attend the funeral of a loved one has been a particularly challenging aspect of the pandemic, and has further separated the reality of death from the experience of wider society. Allowing more people to experience a funeral, and so reflect on the one thing that is a truly universal human experience, can only be a positive.

Along with the promise that we will all face death, is also the promise that we can all hold to the hope of sharing in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. For the Christian, although death is a cause of sadness, it not an ending but a beginning, and not a source of dread but of hope. At a time when we have all lost so much in the past year, we can find comfort in that promise new life in Christ.

# **CHARITY WALK**

I am planning to do a solo charity walk this summer, starting at John O'Groats and ending in Land's End, which is about 1000 miles, and I am hoping to complete it in 60 days.

Because I have suffered three mini strokes and I am a type 2 diabetic, these are the charities I would like to support. I will shortly be opening a Just Giving Facebook page to enable anyone to easily support the walk.

I will be carrying a lightweight tent, sleeping bag, and some other essentials. My flight north is booked for 14th July. I am, fingers crossed, hopeful for pleasant Many thanks. summer weather, but who knows. Camping can be pleasurable, but where possible I will occasionally

book into a B&B. I am also planning to end each day with a couple of bags of litter collected from the verges as I get to the end of my days walk...a small gesture, but it will make me feel better.

I know my friends and family will keep you all updated via Facebook and the Mottisfont Neighbours WhatsApp. Please tell your friends: it can only help the charities. I will also keep a daily record of my travels, and maybe some pictures.
