Radical new proposal for goods yard development

A new player has emerged in the long-running saga of the development of the former goods yard at Dunbridge. Gester Developments of Laughterton, Lincs., a little known but highly innovative architectural design house, will shortly be lodging its proposals with borough planners, and is optimistic that they will attract considerable attention.

"We have looked into the points raised about previous proposals for this site," said Gester's press officer, "and concluded that to get round issues related to the number of houses, capacity of the sewer, and parking, we needed to think outside the box, and even think the unthinkable. We are therefore proposing the construction of a two storey, steel-framed car park."

"It may not be the prettiest of buildings," they admitted, "but let's face it, nearly anything would be better than what is there now."

They went on to explain that in their view "you can't have too much parking," and that it would open up opportunities for use as overflow parking for Mottisfont Abbey.

There would also be business opportunities for car valeting services, a cafe (but probably just a coffee vending machine), and for park-and-ride services to Romsey and Salisbury, although in this case the ride part would involve trains rather than the usual buses. The resulting increase in the use of the station might even inspire the rail company to install a ticket machine.

Gester Developments originally intended to lodge their application with the Planning Department on 1st April, but as this is a bank holiday this will now take place at a later date.

THIS YEAR'S VILLAGE FETE – CANCELLED?

At our recent meeting the village hall committee reluctantly decided that there will not be a fete in August this year unless more volunteers come forward to help.

Happy Easter from Mottisfont!

As we gear up for the season ahead, please be aware that we are expecting to be busy over the Easter Weekend and school holidays, especially if the weather is warm and sunny. We have made some small changes in our main car park to help with traffic flows and increase capacity a little, and have a full car park team in over Easter. It is far too wet to open an overflow car park at the moment, but we will be looking to open that in or just before June, weather and roses depending.

Looking ahead, we will be celebrating the 800th anniversary of the consecration of Mottisfont Abbey priory on Sunday 26th May 2024. We will be running medieval walks at 2.30pm. One of our volunteers is liaising with local churches to plan a small celebration at 3pm.

This year is the 50th anniversary of the creation of the Rose Garden, which was planted between 1972 and 1974, and we'll be open until 8pm again on Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings from Thursday 30th May to Saturday 29th June.

In the gardens...

Daffodils are blooming beneath our giant plane trees and brightening up the beds of the winter garden. The parterre in front of the house is filled with Delft Blue hyacinths, and 15 Mount Fuji cherry trees are bursting into frothy white blossom. The small cherry orchard is established in a bio-diverse meadow, which reveals bright spots of colour from narcissi and fritillaries. Tulips flower in the walled gardens, and the Kitchen Garden will be planted with produce once the risk of frost has passed.

The first roses will start to emerge in May, particularly wall-climbing varieties, building up to rose season in June. Looking ahead to rose season, we'll be offering extended opening hours again, with the gardens open until 8pm on Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays from 30th May to 29th June.

For families... Easter 23rd March to 14th April, 10am to 5pm Experience all the fun of a spring fete with our

energetic Easter trail. Have a go at welly wanging, 'egg-sercises', bunny bowling and hoopla. There'll be a craft activity to make and take home, and a spring-themed selfie station, too. £3 per trail, which includes an Easter trail sheet, bunny ears and dairy or vegan and Free From chocolate egg.

May half term 25th March to 2nd June, 10am to 5pm

Choose from one of three themed activity packs to help you explore Mottisfont at your own pace. Find creative inspiration as you discover different artworks in the house and gallery, explore the gardens to find out what's growing at this time of year, or take a walk for a closer look at the natural world.

Each activity booklet includes puzzles and challenges to complete while you explore, as well as a themed scene to cut out, decorate and keep. £2 per pack.

In the gallery... Exhibition: Heath Robinson at War Until 14th April, 11am to 4.30pm

Over 50 artworks of humorous drawings from both World Wars, demonstrating Heath Robinson's ability to counter the horrors of war with gentle satire and absurdity. You'll also be able to hear transcripts of letters from the troops and the public thanking him for his morale-raising efforts.

From mid-May to mid-July, we'll be showcasing highlights from the Derek Hill Collection of 20th-century art in two rooms of the gallery.

In the house...

You can catch some curtain conservation in action on a weekday visit to the house this spring. Original features of last owner Maud Russell's design scheme for the house, the curtains and pelmet found in the Study are one of only a small number of objects donated to the National Trust along with the house and grounds. But the pelmet attachment was beginning to fail, and light damage has deteriorated the floral chintz and its lining.

The curtains have also become very dirty over time. A specialist textile conservator will be carrying out treatment over the coming months, which will provide stabilisation and ensure we can re-hang the curtains more fit for future years.

CHOICES

The Lent course this year focussed on the Old Testament book of Ruth. Tucked away at the beginning of the Bible just after the awesome book of Judges is Ruth, a heart warming story of famine, death, separation and loyalty, but which ends with a perfect romance, a marriage and a direct line to Jesus. The book of Ruth starts as a study of the choices that confront us as humans each day of the week. Someone once said it's not the chances we take that determine the course of our lives, but the choices we make. As we considered the choices that Ruth and her relatives had to make, and as we swapped famine for war and economic and political persecution, we realised just what a contemporary message the book of Ruth had for us all.

Choices we make as individuals so often have a longstanding effect on others. The impact of the choices we make about our life partners and occupations live with us throughout our lives. We might ask whether it is possible to make choices in this life which will affect the direction of our eternal lives. Joshua said to the Hebrew people he led, "Choose you this day who you will serve".

We know that decisions we make in our secular lives often influence our mental and spiritual lives. But can

the choices we make now affect our eternal destiny? Jesus said to Nicodemus (John 3), "I tell you the truth. No one can see the kingdom of God unless he is born again."

As a benefice we will soon be making choices about a new vicar to lead the benefice. It may not be obvious who that person should be, and so we need to be listening to God to perceive the person of his choosing.

Samuel the great prophet was given the task of finding, identifying and then anointing the new king of Israel, who would be a forebear of Jesus himself. He was led to visit Jesse, a noble man with 8 sons, all of whom might have fitted the bill as a potential king. Samuel had to meet all 8 sons before realising that David, the youngest and therefore the least qualified, was the person who God had chosen as their leader. And what a leader he became. Yes, David made mistakes, but he understood his people and listened to God when he needed guidance as to the way forward.

Do pray with us that the person of God's choosing will be appointed as our new vicar. Thank you.

In February, our guest speaker was local historian Phoebe Merrick. Her topic was "The highways of Romsey" and we NSPIRING WOMEN were expecting to see familiar roads and streets in days gone

by. Unfortunately Phoebe's computer chose to go on strike and refused to work, but, undaunted, Phoebe calmly stood and talked for an hour about the development of Romsey and its roads from Saxon times.

The Abbey of course owned much of the area in the middle ages, and the town gradually expanded thereafter. There are records of Cherville Street in the 13th Century, and early evidence of the Bell Street area too.

We learned about the canal which flowed from Southampton to Andover in the 1790s and the coming of the railway in 1840. This led to the construction of the Alma Road and Station Road areas, where there had once been fields.

The many waterways which surround Romsey led to the building of mills, initially for the finishing of high grade woollen cloth, and later for flour and paper making. Even those of us born and bred in the area learned some new facts - and all without the speaker using a note or slide to jog her memory!

Our speaker in March came from another country altogether. Analiza Jones lived originally in the Philippines but married an Englishman, and has lived here now for a good number of years.

She brought with her a great selection of very attractive bags, in all shapes and sizes. These were made by natives of the Philippines, using fibres from the leaves and stalks of the banana and aucuba trees.

Analiza's computer DID work, and we were shown pictures of the hard and often dangerous work entailed by the locals in extracting and preparing the fibres for weaving the most attractive bags. These bags were offered for sale at the end of the talk, for very reasonable prices, and several members took advantage of the offer - it's never too early to start your Christmas shopping!

We were told of a Fashion Show for local charities to take place in May and also of a chance to see the musical "Oliver" at the Plaza. A team is needed for the W I Group Quiz, also in May.

Next month, on 9th April, Tim Benson, vicar of the Braishfield benefice, will talk about his life as a vicar, which promises to be both amusing and informative. Why not come along and join us for a friendly evening with coffee and biscuits afterwards?


